Language levels and certificates

Learning German

Learning German is an essential prerequisite for successful integration into social life in Germany. It is also the key to taking up an apprenticeship or employment. Learning German means acquiring skills that can improve the quality of your professional and private life.

There are six levels for language courses: A1, A2, B1, B2, C1 and C2. The six levels mean in detail

A1: Beginner

- You can understand and use simple words and sentences.
- You can introduce yourself and others.
- You can ask questions about yourself.
- You can answer questions.
- A person speaks slowly and clearly. You can converse with them.

A2: Basic knowledge

- You can understand sentences and frequently used words.
- You can communicate in simple, everyday situations. You can describe your background, education and environment.

B1: Advanced use of language

- You can understand a lot.
- You can say something about familiar topics and personal interests.
- You can talk about experiences and events, dreams, hopes and goals.
- You can give brief reasons or explanations for plans and opinions.

B2: Independent use of language

- You can understand the most important content of complex texts on concrete and abstract topics.
- You can also understand specialised discussions in your field of specialisation.
- You can communicate fluently and spontaneously.
- You can justify a point of view on a topical issue with advantages and disadvantages.

C1: Specialised language skills

- You can understand a lot of demanding, longer texts.
- You also grasp implicit meanings.





• You can express yourself clearly, in a structured and detailed way on complex issues.

C2: (Near) native speaker level

- You can understand practically everything you read or hear with ease.
- You can summarise information from different written and oral sources.
- You can give reasons and explanations in a coherent presentation.
- You can express yourself spontaneously, very fluently, precisely and with nuance.

Language Courses

Initial orientation courses

German courses for initial orientation

The German courses for initial orientation provide basic German language skills and information about life in Germany. They help participants to find their feet in their new environment. A course comprises 300 teaching units of 45 minutes each.

What do you learn in an initial orientation course?

- · Information about life in Germany
- German for everyday life (work, health, mobility, housing)
- other topics: Values, customs and traditions, living together

The focus is on oral communication so that participants can quickly get to grips with everyday life. The courses also teach important values.

Who can take part?

Asylum seekers who do not come from a country with a high recognition rate or from a safe country of origin.

Integration courses

In this course you will learn German. You will learn more than just the basics. At the end of the course you will be able to speak German at level B1. You will also learn about the culture, politics and social customs in Germany. If you are still a minor, you can take part in a special course for young people. The integration courses are free of charge for refugees and other





target groups who receive social benefits.

The integration course concludes with the examinations "Deutschtest für Zuwanderer" (DTZ) and "Leben in Deutschland" (LiD).

The job centre, the social welfare office or the immigration office can oblige you to take part in an integration course. You have not been obliged? But you would like to take part in a course? Then you can apply for an integration course at the Federal Office for Migration and Refugees (BAMF). Do you need help with the application? Then contact the <u>district</u> <u>administration</u> or a <u>migration advice centre</u>. They will help you choose an integration course provider.

Professional language courses

The vocational language courses (BSK) are a language learning programme for immigrants. This will improve your chances on the labour market.

In order to participate, you must have completed an <u>integration course</u> or have reached language level B1.

If you receive social benefits, the course is free of charge.

Language mediation and communication, interpreting

Translation of documents





Official documents such as certificates, marriage certificates or birth certificates must be notarised in Germany. They must therefore be translated by state-certified interpreters. These translations cost money. They can be very expensive. Check whether a certified translation is actually needed.
