Landshut traditionell

Landshut is a very old city. It was founded by the Bavarian Duke Ludwig I in 1204.





The city of Landshut has many beautiful traditions.

Big traditional events take regularly place in Landshut.

• One of them is the Wedding of Landshut.

<u>The Wedding of Landshut</u> is a historical festival, a medieval show which is performed every four years in the city in summer.

• Another lovely tradition is the Landshuter Dult.

The Dult takes place twice a year. The two Dults, Frühjahrsdult and Bartlmädult, are both attended by around 300,000 people.

The Dult is like a small Oktoberfest in Landshut.

• Landshut Christmas Market

Every year from 25th November to 23rd December the <u>traditional Landshut Christmas</u> <u>Market</u> takes place.

The Landshut Christkindlmarkt is considered one of the most beautiful Christmas markets in Bavaria. The market consists of about 50 shops.

Beside the culinary offers, the Christkindlmarkt also offers a wide range of Christmas articles and gift ideas.

On Saturdays and Sundays there is live music. A train and a children's carousel make their rounds for the youngest visitors. For the children, there are various hands-on activities taking place in the Lebkuchenhaus.

• Der Wochenmarkt (weekly market)

Every Friday from 7 am to 12:30 pm in the Untere Neustadt in Landshut, there is a weekly market.

The weekly market offers a very extensive and varied assortment. You can buy fresh fruit and vegetables, cheese and sausage specialties, fresh fish, flowers and much more there.

Landshut interculturell

People from 113 countries live in Landshut. A lot of cultures build our urban society in Landshut.

Year by year, our society becomes more and more diverse.

This social change requires all of us to be more open and tolerant towards other people.

Diversity enriches our society.





Besides the traditional festivals, there are many international festivals taking place in Landshut today.

A lot of international events are organized.

These festivals and events aim to promote the peaceful coexistence of all people in the city.

• Intercultural Weeks in Landshut

For over 35 years, the Intercultural Weeks take place annually in Landshut.

Numerous events take place during the intercultural weeks: Readings, music, films, theater and cultural events, lectures, discussions, workshops, seminars, festivals, sports events, open days in religious communities, interreligious peace prayers, etc.

An important event, held annually in Landshut as part of the Intercultural Weeks, is the Festival of Cultures.

The Festival of Cultures has established itself as a popular meeting place for Landshut citizens from different international cultures.

People with and without a migration background can meet and get to know each other and their cultures in an informal environment, with free admission, at Ländtorplatz.

• Weeks against racism

Racism and discrimination have no place in Landshut.

Since 2006, Landshut's Weeks Against Racism are taking place in our municipality. Every year, more and more municipal and civil society actors contribute to the programme and stand up together against racism. In the meantime, the programme extends over four weeks.

• Africa Days in Landshut

Since 2002, <u>the festival "Afrikatage"</u> annually takes place on the area of the youth culture center of the city of Landshut Alte Kaserne.

Each year a composition of Africa market, concerts, children's and cultural programs, workshops and delicious culinary specialties awaits you there.

Between 15,000 and 40,000 visitors enjoy the colorful African culture in Landshut together over three days.

The Basic Law

In every country, there are rules that everyone must abide by. The most important law for Germany is the Basic Law. It is a collection of 146 articles. Each article stands for a law, i.e. a rule. These rules determine how we live together in Germany. The basic rights protect the freedom of each individual. They are set out in Articles 1 to 19 of the Basic Law (catalogue of fundamental rights).

Universal Declaration of Human Rights

Human rights are important rights that always apply to all people around the world. Human rights are rights that every human being has by virtue of being human. They protect the





dignity of every human being and are enjoyed equally by all human beings without distinction of any kind, such as "(...) colour, sex, language, religion, political or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth or other status." (Article 2 of the United Nations Universal Declaration of Human Rights of 10 December 1948)

There are 30 rights. The most important are:

- All people are of equal value.
- Everyone is entitled to their own opinion.
- Everyone has the right to peace and security.

Children's rights

Children need special protection and therefore have special rights. The individual rights of children are set out in the Convention on the Rights of the Child. It was adopted by the UN General Assembly in 1989 and subsequently ratified by 196 states. The UN Convention on the Rights of the Child comprises a total of 54 articles.

Cleanliness and waste separation

Waste separation

Waste is separated in Germany. Cleanliness is very important here. Rubbish must not be thrown on the street, but belongs in rubbish bins. Waste types are separated to protect the environment. Plastic waste is particularly problematic for the environment and should be avoided. Paper is recycled. There are different coloured bins for this.

What goes in which bin?

Paper - blue bin:

For example: newspapers, magazines, exercise books, paper bags, cardboard

Organic waste - brown bin:

For example: food scraps, bones, fish bones

What belongs in the organic waste bin?





Residual waste - grey bin:

For example: Nappies, cigarettes, toiletries

Light materials - Yellow bin:

Only empty packaging: for example yoghurt pots, cans, milk cartons - everything without food waste.

Clothing:

Old clothes should be taken to an old clothes container.

Glass:

Is separated by colour and thrown into glass containers.

The rubbish bins are at every house. For a good neighbourhood, please sort your rubbish correctly and do not leave it next to the bins.

The rubbish bins are placed on the street and emptied by the rubbish collection service, there are fixed collection days.

Holidays and festivals

In the <u>intercultural calendar</u> you will not only find the most important Christian holidays. The festival days of the four other world religions (Buddhism, Hinduism, Islam and Judaism) can also be found.

Potable water





In some countries, you can't drink the tap water.

In those countries, you have to buy the water in the supermarket.

The water from the tap in Landshut is drinking water.



In Landshut you can drink the tap water.

Driving license

Your non-German driving license is valid in Germany only for 6 months.

Your foreign driver's license is after 6 months in Germany no longer valid.

After that, you must get your driver's license re-written and take an exam!



It works like this:

- 1. You look for a driving school where you can make the test.
- 2. The driving school submits the application to the driving license office of the district.
- 3. You go there personally and show your identification documents to verify your identity.

Pfand bottles



Do not throw away glass or plastic bottles that are marked with a so-called " Pfand" (deposit).





These are " Pfand bottles", which means you can bring them back to the supermarket and get money back.

Usually you get 8 to 25 cents back per bottle.

Opening hours and holidays

In Germany, the public holidays and opening hours are regulated by law per federal state.

Usually, the stores open between 7:00 am and 8:00 am and close between 6:00 pm and 8:00 pm.

On Sundays and public holidays almost all stores are closed!

You can't go shopping on Sundays!

Time and Punctuality

In Germany, the time and the punctuality are very important!







If you have an appointment at the immigration office or at the doctor, you should be there five minutes earlier.

Even if you have a private invitation somewhere, you shouldn't be late.

This could be taken as lack of respect.

If you are late, you should say "Entschuldigung".

Rest times

In Germany, there are some important rules. **Rest times** are one of them.

You shouldn't make any noise during these times!

According to the law, **Sunday is a rest day**.

You must be quiet on Sundays if you want to have a good relation to your neighbors.

You are not allowed to do this on Sunday, for example:

listening to music loudly, having a garden party, using a drill or a hammer

and also not mow the lawn

Also, on each day between 10 pm and 6 am is night rest.

Between 1 p.m. and 3 p.m. there is **noon rest**.

On Sunday and holidays, the stores and the public offices are closed in Germany.

On the other hand, a lot of bakeries and also restaurants are open.

Many people have a day off and don't have to go to work.

Language

Information

It is very important to learn German in order to find a job and generally find your feet in Germany. Here you will find opportunities and contact points for appropriate language courses. There are various ways to learn German. Your residence status has an influence on which option you can choose. As long as you cannot speak German well enough yourself, you will need help. You can also find contacts for this here.

Level of language ability and certificates

You can attend a German language class. There are six levels of language ability: A1, A2, B1, B2, C1 and C2. You start at level A1. You speak your mother tongue at level C2. The six steps in detail are:

A1: Beginner

You can understand and use simple words and sentences.

You can introduce yourself and others.

- You can ask personal questions.
- You can answer questions.

Someone is speaking slowly and clearly. You can have a conversation with them.

A2: Basic knowledge

You can understand full sentences and frequently used words.

You can express yourself in simple, everyday situations. You can describe where you come from, what kind of education you have and your surroundings.

B1: Advanced language skills

You can understand a lot. You can speak about topics you are familiar with and your personal interests. You can talk about experiences and events, dreams, hopes and goals. You can provide brief reasons or explanations for your plans and opinions.

B2: Independent language skills

You can understand the most important parts of complex texts on both specific and abstract topics. You can even understand expert discussions in topics you know well.

You can express yourself orally in a spontaneous and fluent manner. You can justify a position on a current issue by giving the pros and cons.

C1: Expert language skills

You can understand much of longer, complex texts. You can also grasp implicit meaning in the text.

You can articulate your opinion on complex topics clearly, extensively and in a well-structured way.

C2: (Approaching) native speaker proficiency

You can understand practically everything you read or hear without effort.

You can summarise information from a variety of written and oral sources. You can reproduce reasoning and explanations in a cohesive way. You can express yourself in a spontaneous, very fluid, precise and nuanced manner.

Language courses

Integration courses

What is an integration course?

In this course you will learn German. You will learn more than just the basics. At the end of the course, you will be able to speak German at level B1. You will also learn about the culture, politics and social customs in Germany. Are you still a minor? Then there is a special course for young people. The integration courses are free of charge for refugees. Do you receive



social benefits? Then the course is also **free of charge**.

The integration course concludes with the examinations "Deutschtest für Zuwanderer" (DTZ) and "Leben in Deutschland" (LiD).

How is the course organised?

An integration course has **two parts**:

- 1. German course
- 2. Orientation course

In the course you will learn German in 600 hours of classroom instruction. A further 100 hours will give you an insight into cultural, political and social life in Germany.

The integration course ends with **two examinations**:

- 1. the German test for immigrants
- 2. life in Germany

If you pass both exams, you will receive the Integration Course Certificate (German B1).

Who can take an integration course?

- Refugees with a residence permit for Germany
- EU citizens with residence in Germany
- Asylum seekers with good prospects of remaining in Germany
- Persons entitled to stay with subsidiary protection

The job centre, the social welfare office or the foreigners authority can oblige you to take part in an integration course. You have not been obliged? But you would like to take part in a course? Then you can apply for an integration course at the Federal Office for Migration and Refugees (BAMF). Do you need help with the application? Then contact your asylum social counselling service or a migration courselling service. They will also help you choose an integration course provider.

German for the job

What is a job-related German course?

The job-related German course prepares you for a job. The course helps you with training or work. The course builds on your integration course.

Who can take part in the job-related German course?

Anyone who can already speak German well or very well (B1, B2 OR C1). Anyone who is registered as a jobseeker or unemployed with the employment agency. Anyone who receives money from the job centre. Foreigners, immigrants, EU citizens, Germans with a migration background

Prerequisite for participation is a language level of at least B1.

MiA courses in Landshut

What are Mia courses?

It is a language learning programme only for women from different home countries. The course instructor is also a woman.

What is the content of the courses?

You talk about topics that are important to you. On some days you go outside together, for example to get to know the city. There are also often activities such as sewing, singing or painting.

A course lasts 34 hours, spread over several weeks or months.

You can take part in up to three courses in a row.

The courses are free of charge.

Online language courses and online study

Online language courses

You can learn German on your smartphone or computer. Take advantage of the great offers to learn German quickly. This way you can make good use of the waiting time for a language course. These offers can also be useful during a language course. You can find more information about the language levels <u>here</u>.

Chance app: The Lunes app accompanies you at school, in training and at work. The app supports you with technical terms and job-specific vocabulary. In various modules you will find numerous vocabulary words with pictures and a supplementary read-aloud function. Various types of exercises (multiple choice, practising articles or writing whole words) promote the learning and retention of vocabulary and are fun at the same time.

Serie ABC: A free alphabetisation app for self-study or as a supplement to a language course. The app is approved as a textbook for integration courses.

 \mathcal{D} <u>Mein Deutschbuch</u>: A comprehensive range of resources for learning German. The website is aimed at learners and teachers, A1-B2.

Outsch-Uni Online (DUO): Language learning programmes for A1 to C2.

Basic language course from Deutsche Welle: This online language course contains modules on literacy and job-related language skills. There is also a placement test.

WHS learning portal: Free German courses. You can also learn to read, write and do maths. There is also help for preparing for school-leaving exams in German, maths and English.

Online study





Refugees and asylum seekers often have difficulties accessing higher education. Kiron Higher Education offers the opportunity to study without tuition fees and without the otherwise required legal documents. The first two years of the degree programme take place as online courses via the internet. All courses are offered in English. However, it is possible to use subtitles in any language. The third year of the programme takes place on site at one of Kiron's partner universities. Students also have the opportunity to learn German during their studies. Various support and counselling services are offered.

University-level study

General information

In Germany, there are many different courses of study. There are also different types of universities:

- Universitäten = universities (more academically focused)
- (Fach-)Hochschulen = universities of applied sciences; polytechnics (more practically focused)
- Duale Hochschulen = "dual universities" (very practically focused)
- Kunst- Film und Musikhochschulen = universities for art, film and music (for the arts and performing arts)

There are public and private universities. Private universities are not necessarily better than public ones – however, students usually have to pay high tuition fees at private universities.

Prerequisites

If you want to study in Germany, you need a university entrance qualification. If you do not have an Abitur degree from a German school, you need to check whether the secondary school degree you obtained in your home country is sufficient for you to enter a German university.

You can find more detailed information on the <u>Anabin</u> website, through the "Recognition in Germany" information portal and on the website of the <u>German Academic Exchange Service</u> (<u>DAAD</u>).

You also need to bring proof of your good German language skills (level C1), such as a certificate from the TestDaF, DSH or telc Deutsch C1 Hochschule.

It is also possible to get support from the educational counselling organisation Garantiefonds Hochschule.

Some universities also offer preparatory semesters during which you can learn German. You should get information directly from the university at which you would like to study. Most universities have counselling services available. Also make note of the deadlines by which you need to apply for a course of study!

Without a university entrance qualification

If you are eligible to study at university in your home country, but not in Germany, you may be able to get access to higher education through a preparatory college (Studienkolleg). There, foreign university applicants are given targeted preparation for future studies at a German research university or university of applied sciences.

Financing and scholarships

As a student in Germany, it is possible to receive financial support through the Bundesausbildungsförderungsgesetz, a federal act for promoting higher education referred to as "BAföG" for short. The payments are made monthly and, in the best case, continue for the duration of your course of study. The monthly sum provided by the BAföG can be somewhere between €399 and €735. Half of the BAföG total must be paid back after course of study has been completed. The exact information on the BAföG changes regularly and can therefore be found under the following link:

As an alternative to the BAföG, it is also possible to get a scholarship. In contrast to the BAföG, a scholarship usually does not need to be paid back. Therefore, one must perform well and take on some voluntary commitments in order to be awarded a scholarship. The amount is often calculated in line with the BAföG. There is also an additional €300 paid monthly, this is known as "Büchergeld".

Organisations that award scholarships are often marked as foundations that offer scholarships. The following foundations offer programmes, among other things, especially for refugees. Please refer to the respective websites for application guidelines and requirements.

One exception is, for example, the guarantee fund by Otto Benecke Stiftung. The programme is aimed at migrants who are new in the country and who would like to get the higher education entrance qualification, want to prepare to go to university, and would like to start their academic career. There is also the Deutschland-Stipendium, which provides €300 monthly as financial support. The Deutschland-Stipendium is awarded through the respective universities.

Children, youth and family

Information

Children, young people and families are particularly well protected in Germany. This protection starts during pregnancy and continues until the child has reached 18 years of age (adult).

In Germany, for example, it is forbidden to beat children!

Children must be brought up in Germany without using violence.

All children must attend school. Special authorities also make sure that children are not harmed by their environment (or even by their family).





Children's rights

As a child, you need special protection. That's why you also have special rights. These rights are set out in the Convention on the Rights of the Child. The General Assembly of the United Nations adopted the Convention in 1989.

The UN Convention on the Rights of the Child can be divided into four groups: the right to life and personal development, equal treatment, the best interests of the child and participation. In detail, this means

- Every child has the right to all the things they need to live. This includes, for example, food and drink or medical treatment.
- The right to go to school is also a child's right, as is the right to play and leisure.
- All girls and boys have the same rights and no child should be treated worse than other children.
- Every child has the right to grow up healthy, cared for and protected from violence.
- Every child has the right to live with their parents or, if the parents are separated, to have contact with both parents.
- All girls and boys have the right to form their own opinion and to stand up for it.

Q Are there issues that affect you as children? Then adults must listen to your opinion and take it into account when making decisions.

Are you experiencing violence? Do you feel unfairly treated? Then the <u>youth welfare office</u> can advise you.

Family benefits

Parental allowance

Parental allowance compensates for restrictions in the parents' income. For all those who can or do not want to work less or at all after the birth. Parents who live separately can also claim parental allowance. The amount of parental allowance depends on the amount of income before claiming. You can claim parental allowance if you have a settlement permit or residence permit in Germany. You can find more detailed information in German, English, Turkish and Russian here.

All parents with a settlement permit or residence permit in Germany are entitled to child benefit. Child benefit is paid for every child from birth until at least the age of 18. German Health System

Basic care for asylum seekers

As an asylum seeker in Germany, you are entitled to basic medical care for acute illnesses and pain. You are also entitled to every officially recommended immunisation and preventive medical check-up. In addition, you will receive free medical services that are essential to "safeguard your health".

See a doctor if

- you are acutely ill or in pain,
- you are **chronically ill**, for example if you have diabetes, epilepsy or mental illness. If you have any remaining medication or the package leaflet for your medication, bring it with you to the doctor's appointment. If you have already been to the doctor or hospital





because of the illness, please also bring the results with you.

- you are pregnant,
- you need a vaccination.

You can choose which doctor you would like to see (free choice of doctor).

If you do not yet have health insurance, you will receive a **sickness certificate** from the responsible office<u>(social welfare office)</u>. Bring the sickness certificate with you to the doctor.

A sickness certificate is valid for one quarter (3 months). You will need a new sickness certificate for each quarter.

For specialist medical treatment, you must apply for a new sickness certificate from the social welfare office.

Information from the Federal Foreign Office and the Federal Office for Migration and Refugees

Here you can find out what is important at the moment - for example, what the current <u>situation</u> is. You can also find rules here if you want to enter Germany or if you need a visa. We have already written down some important questions and answers for you:

I am in Germany without a visa - what can I do now?

If you come from Ukraine, you do not need a visa to come to Germany until **4 December 2025**. From the day you enter the country, you can stay here for up to 90 days without a special permit. You can even stay in Germany without a special residence permit until **4 March 2026**.

During the 90-day visa exemption period, you can consider whether you would like to stay in Germany for longer. There are various options for this:

- You can apply for a residence permit under Section 24 of the Residence Act within 90 days of your first entry into Germany. This provision specifically regulates the situation for war refugees from Ukraine on the basis of the EU decision. You can find out who is eligible for a residence permit under Section 24 of the Residence Act <u>here.</u> You can find answers to the procedure <u>here</u>.
- 2. You can apply for a residence permit for another purpose within 90 days of your first arrival in Germany. For example, to study or for gainful employment. This may be more favourable for you. You can seek advice on this from the authorities if you have an appointment, or you can find out more in advance on the website: <u>https://www.make-it-in-germany.com/</u>.
- 3. Alternatively, you can apply for asylum. However, this option is not recommended due to the less favourable legal consequences such as the restriction on taking up employment and the obligation to live in an initial reception centre.

Do you have a valid residence permit in accordance with Section 24 of the Residence Act as of 1 February 2025?

Your residence permit will be automatically extended and will then be valid until 4 March 2026. You do NOT need to visit the immigration office for this. You can find more information on <u>Germany4Ukraine</u>.

What happens when you arrive in Germany?

When you come to Germany, there are a few important steps that you need to take one after the other. This is how it works:

- First, you register this is called registration.
- If you need help from the state (for example money or food), you will be told where you can live.
- Then you register your new address, i.e. where exactly you now live.
- Finally, you apply for a permit so that you can stay in Germany for longer.

Can I work in Germany with a residence permit for temporary protection?

Yes, you can. However, before you can work, the immigration authority must authorise it. The immigration authority will often already enter in your residence permit that you are allowed to work - even if you do not yet have a job. This is good, because then you no longer need an extra permit from another authority.

The immigration authorities will issue so-called fictitious certificates as soon as you submit your application. These bridge the right of residence until the actual residence title can be issued and granted. The foreigners authority will also enter "Gainful employment permitted" in the fictitious certificate. This fictitious certificate therefore authorises you to work in Germany either as a self-employed person or as an employee. Special professional access requirements (such as a licence to practise medicine or a permit for a trade requiring a licence) naturally apply to persons with temporary protection in the same way as to all others. However, the procedures for recognising foreign professional qualifications are also open to those affected, just like everyone else.

Persons with a residence permit for temporary protection in Germany can also receive counselling and placement services from the employment agencies in accordance with SGB III.

Should people from Ukraine apply for asylum?

No, that is not necessary. The necessary protection is granted in a different, faster procedure. It is therefore recommended that you do not apply for asylum. However, if you want to apply for asylum later, you can still do so.

As a result of the decision to admit war refugees in accordance with Article 5 (1) of Council Directive 2001/55/EC of 20 July 2001 on minimum standards for giving temporary protection, a residence permit in accordance with Section 24 of the Residence Act (AufenthG - Residence Permit for Temporary Protection) will be granted to the group of persons covered by the decision upon application.

Registration upon entry does not constitute an application for asylum. An application for asylum must be submitted to the responsible branch office of the Federal Office for Migration and Refugees in order for an asylum procedure to be carried out.

For these reasons, it is not necessary to file an asylum application to secure a right of residence or to claim social benefits.

Emergency numbers - SOS

You can only go to hospital without a treatment voucher in an **emergency**. An emergency is an acute danger to your health. Do not forget your proof of arrival/ID card! At the hospital, you must prove that you are an asylum seeker with your proof of arrival/your ID and that the costs will be settled via the social welfare office. If you are already registered with a health insurance company, bring your insurance card with you.

Social Welfare Office (Sozialamt)

The purpose of the Sozialamt (Social Welfare Office) is to **provide social support**. This includes the following services:

- Guaranteed minimum pension for the elderly or those with reduced earning capacity
- Help with care
- Help with living costs
- Integration assistance for disabled people
- Help in overcoming particular social difficulties
- Health support
- Help in other life situations

The Social Welfare Office can **give advice and support** if you have any questions about these issues.

At the Social Welfare Office, you will be asked about your financial situation. So you will have to show if you have any valuables such as jewellery or money. You will sign some documents and statements. Please bring all your papers with you. Everyone who is registered on the residence permit (Aufenthaltsgestattung) must come to the appointment.

You will also receive a cheque for your living costs here. You can exchange the cheque for cash (euros) at a bank. Please note that this money must last until your next appointment at the Social Welfare Office (for about 1 month). You will not get any more money until your next





appointment at the Social Welfare Office.

The Social Welfare Office is also your point of contact for the following topics:

- Vouchers for Baby Starter Kits and for your child's school supplies
- Money for train tickets to interview appointments
- Medical certificates, approval for operations and other medical procedures
- Educational and participation package (BuT)
- Activities and employment programme
- Applications for relocation, waiving of the residence requirement

Job Centre

Are you unemployed? Do you need help? The Job Centre provides financial support. It also helps you find work and get qualifications. This depends on your individual needs. The Job Centre makes it possible for you to take a language course, for example. It can help you get career guidance. Or it can help you get recognition for your educational qualifications. Would you like to work? Then you can find information and get advice here: Access to the Job Market.

The Job Centre staff are not allowed to pass on information about clients. Do you have a volunteer accompanying you? Then you need to give them power of attorney. This must be completed in full and signed by both parties.

Solution been rejected? Then the <u>Employment Agency (Agentur für Arbeit)</u> is where you should go for career support.

Steps to take after a positive decision

The Federal Office for Migration and Refugees (BAMF) has given you a positive decision. That means your asylum application has been successful. You are recognised as entitled to asylum. Or you have been granted protection as a refugee. Here are the next steps you need to take:

1. Personal visit

- You must go to the Jobcenter during opening hours
- You will be registered as a client there
- Your background will be registered
- A consultation appointment will be made with the "Leistungsabteilung" (benefits department) An appointment will be made with the "Arbeitsvermittlung" (employment service)




• You will be registered as a jobseeker

2. Benefits department

Important: There is no consultation without an appointment.

• You can apply for benefits. To do this, you need an appointment. The person responsible for you can help with this.

3. Employment agency

- **Important:** There is no consultation without an appointment.
- Have you already attended an integration course? Bring your certificate with you. Otherwise, bring your "Verpflichtung" (obligation statement) with you.
- Do you have documents about school attendance or training? Do you have work references? Have your foreign qualifications been recognised? Bring them with you.
- Tell the staff about your special skills (craftsmanship, language skills, etc.).
- Before the appointment, think about which area of work you are interested in.

Employment Agency (Agentur für Arbeit)

The Employment Agency (Agentur für Arbeit) is your most important point of contact regarding employment. Are you looking for a job? Do you need help choosing a career? Would you like to get your qualifications recognised? Then talk to the Agentur für Arbeit (Employment Agency).

This is important for your child's wellbeing. For more information, see the chapter on <u>children's</u> <u>rights</u>.





The Youth Welfare Office (Jugendamt) supports parents in raising children and youth. Everyone can contact the Youth Welfare Office free of charge. Are you a child or young person? Do you have any problems? Then you can contact the Youth Welfare Office.

Responsibilities of the Youth Welfare Office (Jugendamt):

- Supporting young people in their individual and social development
- Giving parents advice and support on bringing up children
- Protecting children and young people
- Creating a positive environment for young people and families
- Avoiding and dismantling barriers

Have you had a baby? Then the Youth Welfare Office will contact you after a few weeks. They will want to visit you at home. You can familiarise yourself with the Youth Welfare Office. You will be given a whole folder with information and services. These are important for your child and your family.

Unaccompanied minor refugees are also subject to the Youth Welfare Act. This means the Youth Welfare Office is responsible for them.

Refugio Munich is a counselling and treatment centre for traumatised refugees and victims of torture. It has had its own centre in Landshut since 2018.

Here, psychotherapists and social workers look after refugee adults and children with mental health problems.

These can be signs of mental health problems:

- They can 't fall asleep or are often up late at night.
- They have **bad dreams.**
- They have experienced bad things. **Remembering** them **hurts** a lot.
- They often have **headaches**.
- You don't enjoy life and beautiful things.

Do you have one or more of these problems? Then Refugio can help you.

At Refugio you can undergo psychotherapy.

- During psychotherapy, you can talk about your problems.
- We think together: What helps you with your problems?
- You can always speak to us in your native language.
