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Kindergarten, school and education

Childcare

Daycare ("Kita")

Kita is a term for children's day care facility (in German "Kinder-Tages-Einrichtung"). Your child can attend a day care centre before attending school, from one to 12 years. At the Kita your child is looked after by educators and learns many important things. Some facilities also accept children under one year of age. "Krippe", "Kindergarten" and "Horts" are different types of day care centres for different age groups.

Kindergarten

Children aged from 3 years up to school entrance age are looked after in **nursery school** (**kindergarten**). Here, your child can form friendships, learn German by being with carers, children and other parents and explore new things. Visiting a child-care facility is very important and good preparation for school.

Since your child is very well looked after there, you can attend to your own needs during this time. For example, you will have more time to attend a German course and later to get a job.

The federal program "Kita-Einstieg" has published a flyer with information on child daycare in 12 languages. Among others, <u>German</u>, <u>English</u>, <u>Arabic</u>, <u>Persian</u>, <u>Romanian</u> and <u>Turkish</u> are offered. The flyer can be found here.

Kindergarten registration

Unfortunately there are not always enough places in the kindergartens. Sometimes it is necessary to make enquiries at several kindergartens and to have your child put on the waiting list. If you are staying in district council (Landratsamt) accommodation, the assigned social educational counsellors and support workers will help you.



Kindergarten costs

It is worth visiting the kindergarten.

Under certain circumstances, the cost of the kindergarten can be covered, for example, if you do not have work and are receiving benefits from the Landsratamt or the job centre. To do this, you must submit an application at the **youth welfare office of economic aid** in the <u>Landratsamt</u>. Their expert social educational advisors and support workers will be happy to assist you.



Incidentally: One of the best-known German children's programmes, <u>"Die Sendung mit der Maus International"</u>

explains many things you need to know about Germany, and is also available in Arabic, Kurdish and Dari.

Although the programme is primarily aimed at children, adults can also get some useful tips about life in Germany from it.





Types of childcare

Child day care ("Kindertagespflege")

The "Kindertagespflege" is aimed primarily at children under 3 years of age. In day care, qualified childminders look after children by the hour or all day as required. The care of the children takes place in the home of the day care parents, the family or other suitable rooms. You can find more information here.

Krippe

The so-called "Krippe" is a facility for children from one to three years of age. In the day nursery, specially trained staff encourage the children in their development in small groups. Attention and care by the caregivers are especially important.

Kindergarten

The kindergarten is a facility for children from 3 years of age until school entrance. In the kindergarten children can play, paint, do handicrafts and learn with other children. In the last year of kindergarten, the children also have regular pre-school lessons to prepare for school. There are private and public kindergartens. Whether attending kindergarten costs you anything depends on the kindergarten and your place of residence.

After-school care for school children up to 12 years ("Horts")

There are also after-school care options for school children from six to 12 years, so-called "Horts". There are many different childcare models such as after-school care, lunchtime childcare or all-day school. In all models the children are supported in doing their homework. Your primary school or the Youth Welfare Office ("Jugendamt") will tell you which care model exists for (primary) school children in your city.

Schools in the district of Heidenheim

School

General school education


In Germany, all children between 6 and 18 years of age have to go to school (compulsory schooling). If you have school-age children, you should register them immediately at an appropriate school. If you are staying in Landratsamt accommodation, the responsible supervisor will register your child directly at a school. You will then receive an invitation to register at this school. After that, your child can go to school.

Types of schools

There are **different types of schools** in Baden-Württemberg. The school your child goes to depends, among other things, on how old he/she is, but also about his/her school performance:







Primary school

The primary school is a comprehensive school, which runs from the **1st to the 4th class**. After primary school, you move up to a **secondary school**. There are four different secondary schools, which lead to different leaver's certificates: **Hauptschule (basic secondary school, Realschule (standard secondary school)**, **Gymnasium (grammar school)** and **Gesamtschule (comprehensive school)**.

After the basic or standard secondary school ("Hauptschule" or "Realschule") certificate there are many ways to acquire more advanced qualifications (standard or higher secondary school certification "Abitur") in Germany.

Hauptschule and Werkrealschule (Basic secondary school)

The Hauptschule is intended for students who want to do an apprenticeship after leaving school. This school prepares pupils for their working life. Besides theoretical knowledge, the emphasis is on practical knowledge and skills. Hauptschule lasts **5 years**. After successfully completing the final examination, pupils receive a **secondary school leaving certificate**.

Realschule (Standard secondary school)

Pupils here can, for example, learn a second foreign language. More independent learning is expected than in the basic secondary school and you acquire a more advanced general education. Compared to the higher level grammar school ("Gymnasium"), students in a standard secondary school have a more job-related education. The final secondary school leaving certificate from the Realschule (known as the "mittlerer Bildungsabschluss" or "mittlere Reife") generally provides the basis for higher professions of all kinds.

Gymnasium (Grammar school)

Compared to a Realschule and Hauptschule, the pupils here are expected to take even more responsibility. The goal is to prepare for **academic study**. The Gymnasium lasts **8 or 9 years** finishing with a final exam, the university entrance certificate (also called the "**Abitur**").

Comprehensive schools





In comprehensive schools pupils from the 1st class up to the 10th class are **taught together** regardless of their level of performance. As a rule, **all qualifications** which can also be taken at the above mentioned general education schools can be obtained here. Comprehensive schools are always **all-day schools**. You can find more information about comprehensive schools here.

Special needs education

There are special educational institutions for children and young people with disabilities and high special educational needs. You can find more information here.

In principle, higher school certificates can also be completed later. For example, you can also take the Abitur at a Gymnasium after obtaining your intermediate secondary school-leaving certificate (Mittlere Reife). This can also be done, for example, in <u>vocational schools</u> or at <u>night school</u>.

VKL classes

When you are new to Germany, your child usually first attends what is called a "VKL" preparation class.VKL classes are available in all types of schools.In these classes the pupils are there above all to improve their German.The goal is to be able to successfully participate in normal classes as soon as possible. When a student progresses to the normal class, the decision is made in close collaboration between the school management, the teachers, the parents and the student concerned.

General information

Compulsory education:

The parents of children have a duty to ensure that their children **attend school regularly**. If compulsory education is not respected, the parents will be held accountable. A fine can be imposed, since it is considered a misdemeanour.

Reporting ill at school:

If your child is ill, he/she should not go to school. You have to **excuse him/her from attending classes**. To do so, please call the secretary at the school before the start of the lesson and give the name and class of your child. Also say how long your child will not be in class.

Holidays:

You can find a holiday calendar for the current school year here.

School materials:

You usually get a list of things your child needs at school from the school (for example, pens and paper). Please make sure that your child always takes his/her school material to school!

Meeting the costs:

School supplies, bus tickets or school trips cost money. Under certain circumstances, the costs may be borne by the Landratsamt or job centre. To do so, you must submit an **application** for <u>education and participation</u> (<u>BuT application</u>) to the relevant authority. Their expert support workers will be happy to assist you.

There are also **special offers for new immigrants**. These offers are **useful** if you **do not have a <u>training place</u>** and **do not attend a general school**. **Children and youths** up to the age of 18 **must attend school in Germany (**compulsory schooling)!

If you live in district council (Landratsamt) accommodation, the social educational support services will help you with the registration.

VABO: Pre-qualification year work and occupation - without knowledge of German

The young people there mainly **learn German**. The target is <u>level A2 or B1</u>. There are also **practical parts** in factories.

The following types of schooling exist at vocational schools:

career-entry (Berufseinstiegsjahr - BEJ) year or career-preparatory year (Berufsvorbereitungsjahr - BVJ)

These are programmes for students with or without a certain type of secondary-school diploma (Hauptschulabschluss) who are not yet sure what kind of career they are interested in and do not yet have a vocational training placement (apprenticeship). They are introduced to various professions and can build on either a secondary school degree (Hauptschulabschluss) or an educational level equivalent to a "Hauptschulabschluss".

Vocational school (Berufsschule):

At these schools, training is through a dual-track system. This means that part of the vocational training focuses on theory, which is learned at the school, while the other part involves getting practical experience at a company that provides vocational training.

Vocational schools for specific professions (Berufsfachschule):

This type of vocational school offers 1 to 3 years of basic vocational education, preparation for a specific profession or professional qualification. Students can obtain a degree ranging from a secondary school degree one level above the one they have to a basic secondary school degree. This type of vocational school are usually split into the following professional fields:

commercial/business professions home economics/socio-educational care or nursing business/technical professions You can get more information here.

Preparatory training school (Fachschule):

This type of preparatory training school offers one- or two-year programmes for professional development. This means that students are building on their previously completed vocational training programme and corresponding employment, and further developing the qualifications they have already acquired. These schools prepare students for mid-level management or self-employment. These schools are likewise split up into the following subject areas:

Technology
Economics
Social work
Agricultural economics
Design

Vocational college (Berufskolleg):

Vocational colleges, which offer programmes of between one and three years, build on a basic secondary-school degree, and students aim to achieve a more advanced professional qualification or qualification for higher education at a technical university (eligibility for university study). There are vocational colleges for the following fields:

Technology
Economics and administration
Social education
Health and nursing
Home economics

<u>Upper secondary vocational school (Berufsoberschule)</u>:

To attend an upper secondary vocational school, you need to have already completed a vocational training programme (apprenticeship) and, at minimum, a basic secondary school degree (mittlerer Schulabschluss). These schools' programmes usually last two years and prepare students for a subject-specific university entrance certificate or, if they speak a second foreign language, a general university entrance certificate. This makes them eligible to study at a university. The following types of upper secondary vocational schools exist:

Technical upper secondary school (Technische Oberschule)
Upper secondary school for economics (Wirtschaftsoberschule)
Upper secondary school for social work (Oberschule für Sozialwesen)

Vocational grammar school (Berufliches Gymnasium):

Students with a basic secondary-school degree and average grade of 3.0 in the main subjects may attend a three-year vocational grammar school. The vocational grammar school ends with a general university entrance certificate (Abitur) and makes the student eligible to study at any research university or university of applied sciences. This type of school is likewise split up into corresponding subject areas:

Technical subjects
Economics
Social work and healthcare
Agricultural sciences
Biotechnological subjects
Nutritional science

Extra tuition and learning support

Tutoring or learning assistance is **additional support for a school subject outside of class**. This usually has to be paid for by the student.

Tutoring and learning assistance are useful, for example, if promotion or graduation are at risk or if someone does not know a lot of the content in class. **Talk to the teachers** at school and ask whether tutoring or learning assistance makes sense. Maybe the school itself has something to offer.

It is sometimes possible to get paid learning support through education and participation. You will need confirmation from the school that this is necessary.

Education and participation package (BuT)

Do you receive social benefits? If so, you may receive financial support for your child through the "education and participation package".

This is possible for

- Children up to their 18th birthday and
- for young adults up to their 25th birthday,

who attend school but do not earn money as part of an apprenticeship.

The benefits at a glance

One-day excursions and school trips lasting several days with the school or day care centre

If the entire group takes part, these costs are covered:

- travel costs,
- · catering costs and
- the entrance fee

The actual costs incurred are paid

- without pocket money and
- without personal equipment.





The communal lunch

Lunch is paid for. Lunch must be provided by the school or the day care centre.

School transport

If the nearest school is too far away, transport costs can be reimbursed. This is only possible from a certain distance.

School supplies

Schoolchildren receive a lump sum for school materials every half term. The lump sum depends on your standard needs. The amount is adjusted each year. The lump sum is paid in August and February.

Learning support

- Sometimes learning support or tutoring can be paid for. But only for a certain period of time.
- Learning support is only paid if the learning goals are otherwise not achieved.
- Confirmation from the school is always required. The confirmation must be submitted with the application.

Participation in social and cultural life

For children and young people under the age of 18, a maximum of €15 per month for

- membership fees and participation fees in the following areas
 - · sport,
 - · games,
 - · culture and
 - socialising (e.g. football club)
- · lessons in artistic "subjects", for example music lessons
- · participation in camps, for example theatre camps, or guided cultural education activities

Please note:

- The benefits are only for children and young people who receive social benefits.
- Only up to the age of 25 (if attending a general or vocational school) or, in the case of the "cultural and social participation" benefit, children and young people up to the age of 18.
- · Pupils with a training allowance are excluded from the benefit.
- Every child and young person needs a separate application.
- In order to be able to decide whether you will receive benefits, the need must be expressed
 in concrete terms and supported by suitable evidence. Your contact person will tell you which
 documents and evidence are required.

Young VHS:

Summer school

Abendgymnasium Ostwürttemberg evening gymnasium

The evening gymnasium is a <u>school</u> for adults. Here, people can take the middle secondary school certificate (**mittlere Reife**) or the higher secondary school certificate (**Abitur**). This is also possible if you are at work. The **lessons are in the evening** or at the weekend. There is a cost for it (€500 a year). If you don't have much money, there is support available. Then you have to pay less.
