Learn German

Levels of language ability

There are different levels of language ability. The language and integration courses use the levels of the  [Common European Framework of Reference](#) or CEFR:

Language level A: elementary language use

Language level B: independent use of language (necessary for training or work)

Language level C: competent use of language (necessary for studies and certain professions)

There are even more sub-divisions in the levels:

A1: Beginner

A2: Basic knowledge

B1: Advanced language skills

B2: Independent language skills

C1: Expert language skills

C2: Approaching native-speaker proficiency






There are even further distinctions within these levels (for example A1/1, A1/2, A2/1, A2/2).

German certificates

What German certificates are there?

In Germany, there are various tests that will determine your language level:

-  [German Test for Immigrants \(DTZ\)](#)
-  [telc](#)
-  [TestDaf](#)
-  [Goethe Certificate](#)
-  [German Language Examination for University Admission \(DSH\)](#)

You will need language certificates, for example, when you apply for a residence title at the Immigrations Office or it may also be required by an employer. That is why it is important that you find out exactly which language certificate you need.

Do I need a German certificate?

In the situations explained below, you either need a certificate confirming your German language level or it is very much recommended.

Application for an apprenticeship or job

A certificate confirming your German language level improves your chances of getting an apprenticeship or job. You will stand out better compared to other applicants if you have a certificate.

Vocational further education or qualification

Certain German language levels and corresponding certificates are often required for participation in vocational qualification programmes.

Access to studying at colleges of higher education and universities

You will need sufficient German language skills to study at a college or university. Each university will decide for itself which certificates are accepted. That is why it is best practice to speak to the university directly and find out which German certificate you need.

For permanent residence (settlement permit) or for naturalisation (obtaining German citizenship)

You must demonstrate sufficient knowledge of German for both the settlement permit and for naturalisation. This is possible, among other things, with the "Deutsch-Test für Zuwanderer" (DTZ) certificate. You will receive this certificate, for example, after successfully attending an [integration course](#). A German school-leaving qualification can also serve as a certificate of German competency.

In addition, you must also prove that you have acquired knowledge of the legal and social order and living conditions applicable in Germany. You can do this, for example, by sitting the "Living in Germany" (LiD) test. You will complete the orientation course by sitting this LiD test. The orientation course forms part of the integration course.

Language Courses

Integration courses (A0 - B1)


What is an integration course?

An integration course consists of a language course with the goal of B1 and an orientation course. The language course lasts a total of 600 teaching units (TU) in the general integration course, up to 900 TU in special courses and 400 TU in the intensive course. The orientation course generally lasts 100 TU.

Each 100 teaching units form a course section, a so-called "Modul".


In addition to the general integration course, there are special courses with 900 units:

- For people who cannot read or write at all or not well. These courses are called **literacy courses** ("**Alpha-Kurs**") or **courses for people with low literacy skills** ("**GeLi-Kurs**").
- For people who do not yet know the Latin script but can read and write in another script. This course is called "**Zweitschriftlerner-Kurs**" (Secondary Literacy Course).

The language course concludes with the "Deutsch-Test für Zuwanderer" (DTZ) exam. The orientation course concludes with the  ["Living in Germany" test](#) (LiD-Test).

Am I allowed to take part in an integration course?


You need authorisation from the BAMF to take part in an integration course. The authorisation is called "Berechtigungsschein" (certificate of eligibility). Whether you can obtain a certificate of eligibility depends on your residence status.

You can only take part in an integration course without an authorisation certificate if there are still places available. Without a certificate of eligibility, you will have to pay the full cost of €458 per module yourself. You will then take part as a "self-payer".



Who is not allowed to take part?



- Teenagers and young adults who are still attending school.
- People with a tolerated stay permit ("Duldung") may only take part in certain cases. Please contact the  [Office for Integration in the District of Munich](#)

How can I obtain a certificate of eligibility?#

 **Note:** Due to the current budget situation, the **BAMF has not approved any applications** for admission to integration courses since the beginning of 2026 (Section 44 (4) of the Residence Act). **Permits** for persons with a **legal entitlement** will **continue** to be issued by the **immigration offices and job centers** (as of February 2026).

You can obtain a certificate of eligibility either from the immigration authority, the job centre or by applying to the BAMF.

- If you receive benefits from the job centre, please contact the  [case management](#).
- If you are still in the asylum procedure and have a "Aufenthaltsgestattung", submit an  [application for admission to](#) the BAMF (**currently not possible**).

- If you are an EU national, submit an  [application for admission](#) to the BAMF (**currently not possible**).
- If you have a residence permit for at least 1 year:
 - If you have received your residence permit for the first time, i.e. it has not yet been extended, contact the [Immigration Authority \(Ausländerbehörde\)](#)
 - If your residence permit has already been extended, submit an  [application for admission](#) to the BAMF (**currently not possible**).


Your admission to the integration course is valid for one year. In the confirmation you will find a date until which you can register for an integration course with a course provider. Please note that your authorisation to participate expires if you interrupt your course participation for longer than one year.

How much does an integration course cost?

The BAMF bears the majority of the costs for the integration course. You pay €2.29 per lesson (as of 2025), i.e. €229 per module.

If you successfully complete the integration course within two years, you can get 50% of your own contribution back from the BAMF. For courses with 900 units, the deadline is three years. To do this, you must submit an [application for reimbursement](#) to the relevant regional office of the BAMF.

If you receive social benefits or have a low income, you can [apply for cost exemption](#). The BAMF will then cover the entire cost of the course and you will not have to pay anything.

 If you need help with any application, please contact your language school.

The integration course is generally free of charge for the following people:


- Persons in the asylum procedure with a "Aufenthaltsgestattung",
- Persons with a residence permit according to § 25 paragraph 5 of the Residence Act,
- Persons who have received their entitlement from the job centre,
- late repatriates.

How can I register?

With your authorisation certificate you can register directly with a provider of your choice. The language school will carry out a placement test with you at the start of a course. Based on the test result, you will receive a recommendation for a course type and a course module. You can then register for a course.

Integration courses are offered, for example, at  [adult education centres](#). You can find other providers here:  [BAMF-Navl](#) (available in German and English).

German course for the job / Occupational language course (B2)


What is a vocational language course (BSK)?

There are different types of job-related German courses. There are basic occupational language courses and specialised occupational language courses. In the basic BSK you improve your general language skills. In specialised BSK you learn, for example, technical terms for your profession.

The occupational language courses have a target language level of B2. They consist of 400 or 500 teaching units.

You can attend a BSK during your occupation, professional recognition, job training or a vocational qualification programme.

Can I take part in an occupational language course?


You need authorisation from the BAMF to take part in an occupational language course. The authorisation is called a "Berechtigungsschein" (certificate of eligibility). Participation is independent of your residence status.

How do I obtain a certificate of eligibility for an occupational language course?

- If you receive citizen's allowance from the job centre, contact your [case management](#). Participation in the course is then free of charge for you.
- If you are unemployed and **do not** receive a citizen's allowance from the job centre, please contact the [Agentur für Arbeit München](#). Participation in the course is then free of charge for you.
- If you are employed and subject to social security contributions, [apply for admission](#) to the BAMF. Depending on your income, you will need to pay a contribution to the costs. Send the application with all documents by post to:

How do I register for an occupational language course?

Use the authorisation certificate to register with a certified course provider of your choice:  [Kursnet: Search for occupational language course](#) (in German).

Occupational language courses for trainees (Azubi-BSK)

Occupational language courses for trainees support people before or during in-company training.

The lessons take place directly at the vocational school, at a nearby language course provider or digitally.

Participation is free of charge.

Standard and Intensive Courses

In addition to the state-funded  [integration courses](#) and  [professional language courses](#), there are many private language schools. Courses run by private language schools are usually very expensive. You usually have to pay for them yourself. You can attend German courses at a  [adult education centre](#) if you are looking for an inexpensive and good alternative. There are adult education centres that run German courses in the district and in the city of Munich. You usually have to pay extra for  [official language exams and certificates](#).


Standard courses teach you the target language at a normal pace. Intensive courses, however, will teach you the language at an accelerated rate. You will cover the same learning content as a standard course, but in a much shorter time.

Learning German online

Learn German yourself


There are many free online programmes to help you learn German. Either with your smartphone or with your computer. This way you can make good use of your time if you have to wait for a language course. Online trainers can also be helpful as support during a language course. All of the following services are **free of charge**:

- The  [Ankommen App](#) provides basic knowledge. It contains information on life in Germany and on the topics of asylum, training and work. There is also an online course for the first few weeks in Germany. The course is at A1 level:

Communication aids

Aids to communication

If you do not yet speak German, it can be difficult to communicate with others. There are free aids that you can use:

- **Google Translate:** Translates the text you enter, but also pictures of texts you have taken with the camera. Can be used as a [🌐 website](#) or as an app via [🌐 Google Play Store \(Android\)](#) or [🌐 App Store \(IOS\)](#).
- **DeepL:** Translates written and spoken text - so you can type or speak a text. Also translates images of texts that you have taken with the camera. Can be used as a [🌐 website](#) or as an app via [🌐 Google Play Store \(Android\)](#) or [🌐 App Store \(IOS\)](#).
- **PONS:** Translates the text you enter. A dictionary also helps you learn German. [🌐 Website](#)
- **Reverso:** is a [🌐 website](#) and translates the text you enter. You can also upload documents and have them translated.
- **Speak & Translate:** There are many free apps that recognise and translate spoken language. They translate voices and read aloud. Some apps also work in offline mode. Download them from your app store.
- [🌐 Oroboo Angel:](#) finds language partners. In difficult situations, you can quickly connect with a person who speaks the language via video or phone. 5-minute chat with possible extension. There are many different language combinations.
- The [🌐 picture dictionary](#) helps when you have a doctor's appointment.

💡 Note: You can't always rely on the tools. You should always get professional help with important documents!

Interpreting and translation

TranslAID: Volunteer interpreters

TranslAid finds volunteer interpreters to assist refugees and migrants, for example, with personal appointments, doctor's visits or visits to the authorities.

Cultural interpreters

Cultural interpreters are people who have also experienced migration and who have received specialist training in language and cultural interpreting. In other words: They will interpret conversations and ensure that no misunderstandings arise as a result of cultural differences.

Some authorities and institutions may instruct (cultural) interpreters to assist with consultations. The service is free. It is therefore best practice to ask whether an interpreter will be present when you make an appointment.

Test "Leben in Deutschland" / Citizenship test

What is the test "Leben in Deutschland"? What is the citizenship test?

The test "Leben in Deutschland" (also known as "LiD test") and the citizenship test ("Einbürgerungstest") are the same test. They are just two different names.

By successfully completing the test "Leben in Deutschland", you demonstrate your knowledge of the legal and social order and living conditions in Germany. You will often be asked by the Migration authorities to provide proof of the LiD test. For example, if you are applying for citizenship.

The LiD test consists of 33 questions. You have 60 minutes to complete it. There are four possible answers to each question. Only one answer is correct. If you answer at least 17 questions correctly, you have passed the test. If you answer fewer than 17 questions correctly, you can retake the test.

Taking the LiD test costs 25 euros.

How can I prepare for the test?

You can prepare for the test yourself or you can take a preparation course.

If you want to prepare yourself, you can practise all 310 possible test questions online: [🌐 BAMF question catalogue for test preparation](#). To start, select "Bavaria" as your federal state. There are also interactive apps to prepare for the "Leben in Deutschland" test in the usual app stores.

How do I register for the LiD test?

Many [🌐 adult](#) education centres (VHS for short) offer test dates. You can find the dates by entering "Einbürgerungstest" in the search field on the VHS website. You can book an appointment with the provider of your choice. Dates often fill up quickly. It is therefore worth comparing the available dates of different providers to avoid long waiting times.

Free German courses
