Benefits according to SGB II

If you have not yet worked in Germany or have worked for less than a year and are now unemployed, you are generally entitled to benefits in accordance with SGB II. You will receive these benefits from the job centre. The benefits include

- Citizen's allowance
- Costs for accommodation and heating
- Money for counselling, placement and integration into work

The basic income support (Grundsicherung für Arbeitssuchende SGB II) is intended to strengthen people's personal responsibility. It is intended to help people find work again and earn enough money for themselves and their family or partnership.

Recruitment of skilled labour from abroad

Do you want to hire or train a person who comes from a country outside the EU? A new law has been in place since March 2024: "Fachkräfteeinwanderungsgesetz". The law makes it easier for people from abroad to come to Germany to work.

With a power of attorney from the skilled worker, you can initiate an accelerated procedure at the Foreigners' Registration Office.

Procedure of the process

- The foreigners authority obtains the approval of the **Federal Employment Agency** and checks the requirements. The recognition centres and the Federal Employment Agency must decide **within certain deadlines**.
- If all requirements are met, the skilled worker can apply for the visa. To do this, they need an appointment at a <u>mission abroad</u> at . The appointment must take place within three weeks.
- Once the visa has been applied for, a decision is usually made within a further three weeks.

Costs

The procedure currently costs \in 411. There are additional costs, for example for the visa, certified copies or translations.

Counselling on the recognition of foreign professional qualifications

Which counselling centre is responsible depends on the training of the skilled worker:

- The 🚱 <u>Chamber of Crafts</u> will advise you on professions in the skilled trades.
- The

Family reunification

If the necessary requirements are met, the spouse and children of the skilled worker can also enter the country. A separate application must be submitted for this.

You and your family do not need a work permit. You can simply look for work there. There are different rules depending on the country.

Do you want to become self-employed in Germany as an EU or EEA citizen? Then please contact the blue trade office in the district administration department.

Would you like to stay in Germany permanently? Then you should apply for a certificate of permanent residence. The relevant information is available at \bigcirc German and \bigcirc English.

Work permit for third-country nationals

Work permit for third-country nationals

The rules for work permits for people from countries outside the <u>EU/EEA</u> are very complex.

For people who have a residence permit, access to the labour market depends on the purpose of their stay in Germany. The <u>foreigners authority</u> will inform you about this when you apply for your residence permit.

For people who are in the asylum procedure, access to the labour market depends on many different factors. For example, the time of entry, your country of origin or the duration of your stay. Some groups of people are not allowed to work. Recently, the laws have been changing very frequently. It is therefore highly recommended that you seek advice on the <u>labour</u> market.

Here is some important general information:

A work permit is required for almost every job. The permit is noted in your residence permit. It states whether you are authorised to pursue a professional activity in Germany.

Please note that you generally also need this entry in your residence permit for the following jobs:

- marginal employment (mini-job)
- most internships
- Vocational training

If you do not have a work permit and work anyway, this can jeopardise your residence and lead to a permanent work ban.



Since November 2023, a new law has been in force for people from abroad who want to work in Germany. It is called the "Skilled Immigration Act". The changes are summarised for you here:

Have you studied abroad? Or learnt a profession? Or worked in a profession? Then you can have it checked whether this qualification can be recognised in Germany. The competent authority will then compare your profession with a similar German profession. Each case is examined individually. This process is called the recognition procedure.

The database O <u>anabin</u> provides information on the education systems of around 180 countries. This will give you an initial assessment.

- <u>Service centre for the development of foreign qualifications</u> for all other professions
- <u>ValiKom Transfer</u> for people who only have work experience but no qualification

What happens after the exam?

You will receive a notification after the examination. This will state the result of the examination:



- is recognised
- is not recognised
- there are differences between your qualification and the corresponding German profession. You can usually compensate for such differences by attending a course.

If you still need a qualification for recognition or there is no recognition for your profession, you can contact the Qualification Support Centre. They will provide you with advice and help in finding suitable courses or possible funding for the courses.

Validation procedure: Recognition of professional experience

For people who have no qualifications but a lot of experience in a profession.



You have no training, but have been working in a profession for some time and know your way around?

In a validation procedure, your professional skills, which you have acquired independently of any formal vocational training, are assessed and certified. If your professional skills have been recognised, you will receive a certificate. This certificate can make it easier for you to find a job, for example.

You will have to pay the costs of the validation procedure yourself. In order to better assess whether a validation procedure makes sense in your case, you can seek advice beforehand. The counselling is free of charge.

Dual education

Dual training

In Germany, it is a great advantage to have a **vocational qualification**. People with a vocational qualification earn more money over the course of their lives, are less likely to become unemployed and are less likely to have fixed-term employment contracts than people who are looking for work without a vocational qualification.



There are two types of training programmes in Germany:

<u>School-based training at a vocational school(school-based training)</u> Students only attend school and learn everything there.

Dual system

Students learn both at a vocational school (about one third of the time) and in a training company (about two thirds of the time). This allows you to learn theory and practice at the same time. During the apprenticeship, you earn a fixed monthly salary.

Dual training is mostly found in commercial professions and industrial-technical professions. Depending on the type of profession you want to learn, you should contact the appropriate organisation:

Chamber of Crafts for Munich and Upper Bavaria (HWK)

The HWK is responsible for skilled trades such as baking, bricklaying, painting and hairdressing. It provides support in the search for an apprenticeship or an introductory qualification, which can precede an apprenticeship. There is a special programme for young people with a migration background who would like to start an apprenticeship in a skilled trade. You can find more information at P here.

Training at a vocational school

There are two types of vocational training in Germany:

<u>Dual system</u> (<u>dual training</u>) Students learn both at a vocational school and in a training company.

<u>School-based training at a vocational school</u> Pupils only attend school and learn everything there.

School-based training usually lasts 1 - 3 years. Depending on the school, there are different training programmes and admission requirements. You can obtain detailed information directly from the school.

School-based training is usually found in professions in the fields of technology, health and social services, art and foreign languages.

Labour contract

Employment contract

Anyone who starts work is given an employment contract. It regulates the most important conditions of an employment relationship, such as

- when and how much you work
- how many days of holiday you have
- how high your salary is
- how long the notice period is



Both sides - employee and employer - must adhere to these agreements. As the contract becomes legally binding when you sign it, you should only sign it once you have fully understood the content.

There are different types of contracts:

Permanent employment contract

There is usually a probationary period of three or six months. During this period, an employment relationship can be terminated by either the employer or the employee at short notice within two weeks. At the end of the probationary period, a permanent employment relationship begins. The protection against dismissal is then longer. Working hours are generally up to 40 hours per week.

Fixed-term employment contract

The employment relationship ends at the agreed time. Cancellation is not necessary.

Mini-job (marginal employment)

The maximum earnings per month are 538 euros and are tax-free. The employee does not have to pay contributions to statutory health insurance and unemployment insurance. You can also be exempted from the pension insurance obligation upon application. People who have a mini-job receive very little pension later on. You must take care of your own health insurance. It is best to seek advice from a statutory health insurance company.

Apply for a certificate of good conduct

Applying for a certificate of good conduct

Some employers want you to provide a certificate of good conduct. Certificates of good conduct serve as proof that someone has no criminal record. The certificate of good conduct is sometimes also called a "police certificate of good conduct". For example, you will need one if you want to work in the security sector, with children or in the public sector.

There are different types of certificate of good conduct:

- for private purposes
- for a public authority
- Extended
- European

Minimum wage

Minimum wage

There is a minimum wage in Germany. It's written in the law. The hourly wage you receive may not be lower. It also applies to overtime.

The current minimum wage per hour is 12.41 euros gross. The amount is regularly increased.

The minimum wage does not apply to

- Young people under the age of 18 without completed vocational training
- People in training
- long-term unemployed persons during the first six months of their employment after becoming unemployed
- school or study-related internships
- Internships for professional orientation up to three months
- Voluntary work

Payroll accounting or payroll accounting

Pay slip or payslip

If you are employed, you will receive a payslip or payslip after the first month. With some employers, you will also receive a statement every month thereafter. With some employers, you will only receive one if something is different than usual. For example, if you receive a Christmas bonus that month or if your insurance contributions have increased.

The following information must appear on the statement:

- Name and address of the employer
- Name, address and date of birth of the employee
- Insurance number of the employer
- The date on which the employment began
- · Tax class and tax identification number
- The period to which the statement relates
- Gross salary (salary without deductions)
- Type and amount of supplements or allowances
- Type and amount of deductions
- Net amount (after all deductions)

The net amount is usually the amount you are paid.

Exception: In the case of advances, loans from the company or salary garnishments (if you have debts), further amounts are deducted from the net amount.



Taxes and social security contributions

Taxes and social security contributions

If you work, you pay part of your salary as taxes and social security contributions. If you are self-employed, you must also pay taxes.

"Bruttogehalt" is the salary without deductions (gross salary). "Nettogehalt" is the salary after taxes and social security contributions have been deducted (net salary).

Income tax

Income tax is a contribution to the financing of federal, state and local government expenditure. Tax money is used, for example, to build roads and schools or to finance social benefits.

- If you are employed, you will receive your net salary. This means that your taxes have already been deducted.
- If you are self-employed, you have to pay tax on your income.

Tax identification number

Every person living in Germany is given their own tax ID ("Steueridentifikationsnummer"). The tax ID is an 11-digit number. It is valid for life. You will receive the number within 2 to 4 weeks of <u>registering</u> your place of residence. Children born in Germany will automatically receive their tax ID by post within three months of their birth. You must keep the documents in a safe place. You will need the number again and again. For example, you will need the number

- when you are working
- for your tax return
- when you apply for child benefit
- when you open a bank account

If you no longer know the number or have not received the letter, you can apply here to have the documents sent to you again: Online form

Tax return

You can claim certain expenses in your annual tax return. This means that the tax you have to pay will be less. Many people are obliged to submit a tax return, so it is best to check with the tax office whether this applies to you. There may be either refunds in your favour or additional payments due to the tax office.

If you need help with your tax return, it is best to contact your local income tax association. The tax office can also help you with further questions.

Social security contributions



In addition to taxes, employees must also pay monthly social security contributions. This is called "Sozialabgaben". You are legally obliged to pay these contributions. If you are employed, the contributions are automatically deducted from your gross salary and paid by the employer to the social insurance organisation.

The social security contributions are made up of contributions for

- Pension insurance
- Unemployment insurance
- health insurance
- nursing care insurance

The amount depends on the individual income.

Social security contributions finance the German social security system. They ensure that everyone is covered. If someone is unable to find work or can no longer work, the most basic living expenses can be covered. For example, if you become unemployed and have previously paid into the unemployment insurance scheme for a certain period of time, you are entitled to unemployment benefit I. You will also receive a state pension in old age if you have paid a monthly contribution into the pension insurance scheme.

There are some exceptions for foreign employees. For example, if they have been posted to Germany by a foreign company. Or if they are employed or self-employed in several countries. Or if they are affected by other exemptions.

One requirement for an unlimited residence permit is that you have paid pension insurance contributions for at least 60 months. This also applies to self-employed persons. There are exceptions here too.

National insurance number

The German Pension Insurance will automatically send you the number by post. You will receive the number as soon as you start your first job in Germany.

Occupational Health and Safety Act / Safety in the workplace

Occupational Health and Safety Act / Safety in the workplace

How is safety in the workplace regulated? Occupational health and safety ensures that you are adequately protected at your workplace. Occupational health and safety applies to you as a person and to your workplace.

There is a law for this. It is called the Occupational Health and Safety Act (ArbSchG) and lays down the rules. These rules are intended to guarantee the health and safety of all employees. The law lays down rules for all areas:

• What obligations regarding occupational health and safety apply to employers?



- What obligations and rights do employees have?
- How are the legal provisions monitored?

Precise prevention measures are defined for workplaces where there is a risk to employees. For example, accidents can be avoided. Employers are responsible for ensuring that the measures are complied with and implemented. Employees must be aware of the measures and be reminded of them regularly.

Employees are obliged to comply with certain regulations. These serve to protect them. For example:

- They must not endanger other people during their work.
- They are obliged to report any defects that could pose a danger.

Accident at work

Accident at work

An accident at work is an accident that occurs during working hours or on the way to or from work.

In this case, you are covered by accident insurance through the company (employer).

If you have an accident at work, please make sure you tell the doctor before you start medical treatment. The treatment will then not be paid for by the health insurance company, but by the employer's accident insurance. You can find out the name of the accident insurance company from your employer.

If you are unable to work due to an accident at work

- are unable to work for longer than one day or
- require prolonged medical treatment or
- become ill again at a later date

you must visit a so-called "Durchgangsärztin" or "Durchgangsarzt".

Works council and trade unions

Works council and trade unions

If you work in Germany, you have the right to defend your interests. You have a say in your workplace and in the company.

Betriebsrat / Personalrat

From a certain size of company, there must be a works council or staff council. This is mandatory by law.



The works council consists of a group of people who also work in the company and are elected by their colleagues. They then represent the interests of all employees. They have a say in certain decisions. If you have a question or a problem, you can turn to them.

For example, the works council can monitor whether the company is doing enough to protect employees from accidents. Or it can receive complaints from workers and pass them on to those responsible. It is consulted when someone starts a new job or is made redundant. They can also have a say in when working hours begin and end, when breaks are taken and when holidays are taken.

Gewerkschaften

If you form a group, you have better opportunities to assert yourself against the company. A trade union is an association of people who stand up for the economic and social interests of employees. They advise their members on labour and social law issues. They negotiate collective agreements and support works councils.

There are eight different trade unions in Germany for the various professional sectors. Which trade union is responsible for you depends on the sector in which you work.

The group of all German trade unions is called "Deutscher Gewerkschaftsbund". There you can find out which trade union is responsible for you.

Irregular and illegal employment

Irregular and illegal employment

If a job is not registered with the tax office or health insurance fund

All work must be registered with the tax office and the health insurance fund. This means that taxes and social security contributions are paid. If a job is not registered there, it is illegal and is referred to as "irregular employment" in Germany. One term for this is "undeclared work".

When work is carried out despite financial help from the state



Social benefits and unemployment benefit is money from the state. The money is intended for people who do not have a job.

If you receive such assistance and would like to take up work, always inform the office from which you receive the money: the <u>Economic Refugee Aid</u>, the <u>Employment Agency</u> or the <u>Job</u> <u>Centre</u>.

You are allowed to receive benefits and earn money. However, you are obliged to report any earnings and income immediately. The benefits will then be recalculated.

If someone receives financial support but still works and conceals this, this is called illegal employment. This means that you are receiving financial support from the state even though you are working. This is prohibited and against the law.

If you do not have a work permit or have a restricted work permit

If you are working even though you do not have a work permit, this is also illegal employment.

Persons who have restricted access to the labour market ("Gestattung" or "Duldung") must apply for an employment permit from the <u>foreigners authority</u> before starting work.

What are the consequences?

There is a risk of fines and imprisonment. Depending on the country of origin and residence permit, illegal employment can also lead to an indefinite work ban.

Labour exploitation

Labour exploitation

Labour exploitation is when unfair conditions prevail at work or the labour force is exploited without the consent of those affected. Those affected receive no or too little money for their work. They have to work under poor or even dangerous conditions. They are threatened or experience violence.

- Slavery and forced labour are prohibited in Germany.
- Human trafficking or forced sex work is prohibited in Germany.

Other forms of exploitation are also punishable by law:

- if no money is paid for the work.
- if the working hours are longer than agreed in the employment contract (evasion of the minimum wage).
- if no wages are paid during illness or paid holidays.

If you are an EU citizen, you can get help and advice from <u>Fair Mobility</u>. If you are a non-EU citizen, you can get help and advice from <u>Fair Integration</u>.

Labour court

Munich Labour Court



The Labour Court is responsible for hearing legal disputes between employers on the one hand and employees on the other. For example, in matters relating to dismissals, cancellation agreements, warnings, etc.


