Interesting facts about Nuremberg

Nuremberg is located in the federal state of Bavaria and in the district of Middle Franconia. Nuremberg has over 500,000 inhabitants and is the second largest city in Bavaria after Munich. A river called the Pegnitz flows right through the city centre.

There are many interesting and beautiful places in Nuremberg. Nuremberg is particularly famous for its medieval [castle \(Kaiserburg\)](#), the [Germanic National Museum](#) and its [Christmas market](#) on the [main square](#).

The city of Nuremberg was first mentioned in an imperial document in 1050. The name Nuremberg goes back to "Norenberc", which can be interpreted as "rocky mountain". This interpretation is based on the fact that Nuremberg Castle was built on a prominent sandstone rock, whereby "rocky mountain" is a possible explanation for the place name. The path up Burgstraße is very steep, but well worth it! From the [viewing point](#), you have a great view over the town. This part of the castle is free of charge.

You can find out lots of interesting facts about Nuremberg's city history in the city museum, the [Fembohaus](#). With the [""Nuremberg Pass](#), admission costs just 1.50 euros.

A very famous Nuremberg artist is Albrecht Dürer. He lived from 1497 to 1528 and was a painter, mathematician and art historian. There are still many reminders of Albrecht Dürer today. For example, there is [Albrecht Dürer Square](#) with a statue of him and his former home is now a museum, the [Albrecht Dürer House](#).

Nuremberg is also famous for toys. This is why the world's largest toy fair is held in Nuremberg. Toys have been made in Nuremberg since the Middle Ages. The history of toys in Nuremberg and the world can be marvelled at in the [Toy Museum](#). Here too, people with a [""Nuremberg Pass](#) only pay 1.50 admission!

Nuremberg is also famous for its gingerbread and sausages. Gingerbread is a biscuit with lots of spices. They have been produced according to a secret recipe since the 14th century and are known all over the world. Nuremberg is also known as the "city of gingerbread". Bratwurst sausages are also produced according to a protected recipe and sold all over the world as a branded product. Small stalls selling "Drei im Weggla" can be found all over the city. This means three Nuremberg sausages in a bread roll.

On 7 December 1835, Germany's first steam locomotive started its journey from Nuremberg to Fürth in Nuremberg. This heralded the industrial age for Nuremberg. The steam locomotive was called "Adler" and can still be seen today in the [Transport Museum](#).

Nuremberg is also known as the city of the Nazi Party Rallies. During the National Socialist era, the Nazi Party Rally Grounds were built in Nuremberg to hold the NSDAP party conferences with hundreds of thousands of participants. Large parts of the site can still be visited today, and the [Nazi Party Rally Grounds Documentation Centre](#) provides detailed information about the historical events. Today, large concert events and car races take place on this site.

After the end of the Second World War, leading representatives of the National Socialist regime had to answer for their crimes before the International Military Tribunal. These "Nuremberg Trials" formed the basis for the further development of international law and are documented in

the [Memorium Nuremberg Trials](#) Museum.

Another reminder of the crimes of the National Socialists is the [Street of Human Rights](#) . Human rights articles in various languages are engraved on 27 pillars. They are intended to call for a peaceful coexistence of cultures.

Are you looking for a specific address or an interesting point in Nuremberg? MAPS-Me offers a navigation function, is free of charge and can be used offline.

Asylum application and BAMF

Are you registered in Germany and live in shared accommodation?! What happens next? The next steps are explained here:

1. Personal application for asylum

- You can apply for asylum at the **BundesAmt für Migration und Flüchtlinge (BAMF)**.
- **Important:**You can only submit your application in person, you cannot send this application by post.
- You will receive the appointment and the responsible BAMF office with your proof of arrival.If you have not received an appointment, ask your accommodation management.

2. First interview appointment (asylum application)

- If your interview appointment is not in Nuremberg, go a few days **before** your first appointment (asylum application, first interview appointment) or your second appointment (hearing, second interview appointment) with your documents to [»»Social Services \(SHA\)](#).
- If you have your first interview with the BAMF in Nuremberg, please remember to bring enough food with you. There may be long waiting times.
- You must report to the [»»Immigration Office after your first appointment](#).

3. Personal hearing

- The second interview appointment is the actual hearing. The BAMF decides on your application for asylum. Then it sends you a decision.

a) The decision is negative

- If the decision is negative and you want to appeal (meaning that you do not agree), immediately **go** to your [»»Asylum Counselling Service](#). There they can discuss with you what can be done and you can consult with specialised lawyers or seek advice from the [»»Refugee Law Clinic](#) .
- If you decide to leave voluntarily you can get financial support for your new start in your home country. [»»Central Return Advisory in Nordbayern \(ZRB\)](#)

b) The decision is positive, meaning that you are recognised. What are the next steps?

- **Fiction or electronic residence permit (eAT):** If the BAMF notice has been given, it is necessary to arrange an identity document or the equivalent: [»»Einwohneramt \(Immigration Office\)](#)
- **Job centre:** You will no longer receive your money from the social welfare office, but you have to apply at the job centre: [»»The Nuremberg job centre](#)
- **Housing:** Helpful tips for finding a house, see [»»Housing](#)

Community Life in Germany

The Basic Law

In every country, there are rules that everyone has to adhere to. The most important law in Germany is the Basic Law. It is a collection of 146 articles. Every article stands for a law - i.e., a rule. These rules govern community life in Germany. The fundamental rights protect the freedom of each individual. They are stipulated in Articles 1 to 19 of the Basic Law (Catalogue of Fundamental Rights).

Protection of Human Dignity

Article 1

(1) Human dignity shall be inviolable. To respect and protect it shall be the duty of all state authority.

(...)

Personal Freedoms

Article 2

(1) Every person shall have the right to free development of his personality insofar as s/he does not violate the rights of others or offend against the constitutional order or the moral law.

(...)

💡 This also means the right to sexual self-determination. This means: All human beings can decide for themselves which sexual acts they want to participate in and nobody can be forced to do something they do not want to do. More information: [»» Sexual Self-Determination](#)

Equality Before the Law

Article 3

(1) All persons shall be equal before the law.

(2) Men and women shall have equal rights. The state shall promote the actual implementation of equal rights for women and men and take steps to eliminate disadvantages that now exist.

(3) No person shall be favoured or disfavoured because of sex, parentage, race, language, homeland and origin, faith, or religious or political opinions. No person shall be disfavoured because of disability.

Freedom of Faith, Conscience and Creed

Article 4

(1) Freedom of faith and of conscience, and freedom to profess a religious or philosophical creed, shall be inviolable.

(...)

Freedom of Expression

Article 5

(1) Every person shall have the right freely to express and disseminate her/his opinions in speech, writing, and pictures and to inform herself/himself without hindrance from generally accessible sources. Freedom of the press and freedom of reporting by means of broadcasts and films shall be guaranteed. There shall be no censorship.

(...)

Marriage and the Family; Children Born Outside of Marriage

Article 6

(1) Marriage and the family shall enjoy the special protection of the state.

(...)

Universal Declaration of Human Rights


Human rights are important rights that apply to everyone all over the world. Human rights are rights that every person has because of their humanity. They protect the dignity of every human being and apply to every person equally, regardless of "race, colour, sex, language, religion, political or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth or other status." (Article 2. of the United Nations' Universal Declaration of Human Rights, issued on 10/12/1948)

There are 30 rights. The most important are:

- All people are of equal value.
- Everyone is allowed to have their own opinion.
- Right to peace and safety.

Visit the Road of Human Rights! Each of the elements in the Road of Human Rights takes one of the human rights articles in German and in another language. The Road of Human Rights is both a denunciation of the crimes committed by the Nazis and a reminder that human rights are still being severely violated in many countries worldwide.

Children's Rights

Children need extra protection, which is why they also have special rights. The individual children's rights are stipulated in the Convention on the Rights of the Child. This was adopted by the UN General Assembly in 1989 and subsequently ratified by 193 countries. The UN Convention on the Rights of the Child includes 54 articles.

Emergency numbers - SOS

Only in the event of an **emergency** may you go to the hospital without a medical treatment certificate. An emergency is an acute threat to health. Do not forget your proof of arrival/ID! At the hospital, you must show your arrival/ID in order to prove that you are an asylum seeker and the costs are covered by Social Services. If you are already registered with a health insurance company, bring your insurance card with you.

💡 Emergency numbers always work on mobile phones, even with pre-paid cards without credit/money!

Important information for an emergency call 112

- **Who** is calling? (your name)
- **Where** did it happen? (address)
- **What has** happened?
- **How** many injured or ill people are there?
- **What type** of injuries or illnesses are there?
- **Wait** for questions!

Stay calm. Remain calm and speak clearly so you are better understood. Do not end the call. The emergency service/police will end the call when all necessary information has been submitted.

Visiting a doctor

If you are physically or mentally ill and need to see a doctor, you will receive a treatment certificate from Social Services. This means your visit to the doctor will be free of charge.

Operations

If an operation is necessary and is **not** an emergency, Social Services must first approve the hospital stay. Your doctor will provide you with a medical certificate. Only medically necessary interventions can be undertaken.

Medication

If you need medication, you can get a prescription from your doctor. You can get your medication with this prescription at any pharmacy. Even with a prescription, not all medication is free of charge. Nevertheless, as an asylum seeker you can get lots of medication free of charge. Consult your doctor. If you don't have a prescription, you must always pay for the medication. Some medication, for example antibiotics, must be prescribed. This means that you can't buy it without a prescription.

Pharmacies (Apotheken) are generally open from Monday to Saturday. The opening times vary according to the pharmacy (often: 09:00 - 18:00). If you urgently need medication at night or at weekends, you will find a sign at each pharmacy with the name and address of the pharmacy that is open for emergency service. This information can also be found on the internet.

Self-help groups

Sex Education

Sex education covers things like naming various body parts, questions on **»»family planning, contraception**, sex, **»»SexuallyTransmittedInfections**, and feelings/relationships.

Children, youth and family


Children, young people and families are particularly well protected in Germany. This protection starts during pregnancy and continues until a child has reached 18 years old (adult). In Germany, for example, it is forbidden to beat children. Education in Germany must be managed without violence. All children must attend school. Special authorities make sure that children are not harmed in society (or by their family).

Children's and youth centres

Open child and youth work

Open child and youth work (OKiA) is for all children and young people. There are many different facilities throughout the city. These include [children's and youth centres](#) for children from primary school upwards:

- Youth centres for young people aged 14 and over
- Street work programmes
- two mobile play centres for children
- Mobile youth work for young people
- supervised [active playgrounds](#) for children

All of these programmes are voluntary and open to all young people of an appropriate age. The children and young people can spend their free time there, meet friends, play or take part in groups. There is also counselling and support, for example with problems at school, at work or in everyday life.

The "[Children and young people in Nuremberg](#)" website lists all the centres with their contact details, opening hours and services. The rooms of the centres can also be used by other groups by prior arrangement. For example, by mother and child groups or as a meeting place for families. To do this, you should speak to the management of the centre.

Spread over the entire city, there are over 200 public playgrounds. Here your children can play outside in the sand, on slides or swings. Playgrounds are open for everyone and are free of charge.

Non-Adult Refugees Without Parents

Refugees under 18 years of age who have been admitted to Germany **without the accompaniment of an adult** are called "minor" refugees (**unbegleitete minderjährige Ausländer/-innen = uMA** - this stands for "unaccompanied underage foreign national"). These young people are registered with the Youth Welfare Office. The Youth Welfare Office speaks to these young people and decides how old it thinks they are. The decision on how old the child is determines whether the Youth Welfare Office will take care of the underage person (aged less than 18) and place them in accommodation especially for young people ("custody"). If the Youth Welfare Office thinks the person is an adult (aged over 18), the person will receive a notice of refusal and be treated as an adult. The Youth Welfare Office will bring an interpreter to the appointment.

Important: If your arrival certificate says that you are under 18 but the Youth Welfare Office gives you a notice of refusal, Youth Welfare Office will enter a different date of birth on the decision. Only then can you have your documents updated at the Immigration Office and at the Social Welfare Office.

Some minors/persons under the age of 18 travel without their parents, but **with relatives** (for example with an uncle or aunt, with cousins or with older siblings). The administration office at your accommodation centre will tell the Youth Welfare Office about this after your arrival. The Youth Welfare Office will speak to the underage person and their adult relatives and check whether the underage person can stay with them. In addition, the Youth Welfare Office will decide whether to appoint a guardian. The Youth Welfare Office will provide an interpreter for the appointment.

Adult relatives can also go to the Family Court to apply to be the child's official guardian. With guardianship, the relative takes full responsibility for the underage person, in place of the parents.

School for Children Aged 6 to 15

In Germany, there is something called "Schulpflicht" - this means "school obligation". This means that in Germany, all children aged between 6 and 15 are legally required to go to school. The parents or guardians have a duty to ensure that their children attend school regularly. Going to state and municipal schools is free of cost.

💡The school often gives children written information to take home with them and give to the parents. It is important that you read this information. If find it hard to understand these letters, ask your [»»Asylum Advice Centre](#) or your [»»Helper Circle](#) **for someone who can help you.**

School Registration

The supervisors of your accommodation will register your child with the State Education Office. You will get a letter inviting you to an appointment at the Education Authority. After that, your child can go to school.

Important: Be sure to bring your child with you! Please also bring an interpreter and the following documents:

- Your ID, your birth certificate or your arrival certificate (Ankunftsnachweis)
- Registration certificate from the Immigration Office (Ausländerbehörde)
- All documents concerning your child (ID, birth certificate, certificates, medical certificates, etc.)

The Bavarian School System

If required, your child will usually be placed in a transitional class to learn German. If your child can speak German well enough, they will be placed in a normal school class. Sometimes, however, there are not enough places in the transitional classes, so it might be the case that your child is placed straight into a regular class.

Class trips, excursions, school trips, school performances and swimming lessons are part of the lessons and the school day in Germany. Your child should participate in these classes, not just because they can learn a lot of new things, but also because these joint activities improve children's enjoyment of school and strengthen their linguistic abilities.

Special Programmes for Refugee Children and Teenagers

There are also special programmes which enable refugee children and teenagers to get started at a secondary school or a "Gymnasium" (an academic high school which focuses on preparing pupils for university):

Entry into high school: The SPRINT programme (intensive language training) is aimed at children and young people who are in transitional classes and have less knowledge of German. After attending a transitional class, the Education Authority can choose school children that it thinks are ready for high school (secondary school). Integration into year group 6 or 7 opens the way for pupils to gain their secondary school diplomas.

A Different Path to the Gymnasium (Academic High School): For particularly talented and motivated school pupils aged up to 15, InGym offers a six-month German course which is intended to pave the way to the Gymnasium. Registration takes place via a Gymnasium that is located nearby. The child will initially attend as a guest student and then move on to the Martin-Behaim-Gymnasium.

School Supplies

You will receive confirmation from the school that your child is registered for the school. Upon receiving confirmation, you can apply to the Social Welfare Office for funding for school supplies. This amounts in total to €100, which is paid out either in one or two instalments. This depends on when your child starts school.

Travel Costs to School

You can send an application to the Education Authority for your child's bus and train costs to be subsidised. This means that you don't have to pay your child's travel costs yourself. This is only possible if your child's school route is longer than 2km (1st to 4th classes). From the 5th class onwards, the route to school must be longer than 3km. Please call the school before 08:00 if your child is ill or if there is another reason that your child can't go to school. Otherwise, the school is obliged to look for your child, if necessary with the police. You may have to pay a fine.

Childcare

What is a Kita?

"Kita" is a word for a children's daycare centre. Before your child starts school and between the ages of 1 and 12 years old, they can attend a kita. Your child will be supervised by nursery school teachers and will learn a lot of important things.

Why is a kita good for my child?

Here, your child can learn German and discover new things. There they also have contact with other children, make friends and learn about German cultures. Take advantage of this opportunity; it is important for your child's future. Attending a children's daycare centre is also good preparation for school.

Unfortunately, there are not always enough places close to your home or accommodation. To find a place, ask your accommodation's support team or the City of Nuremberg's Youth Welfare Office.

What types of childcare are available?


- If your child is 1-3 years old, the daycare centre is called "**Krippe**".
- If your child is 3-6 years old, the daycare centre is called "**Kindergarten**" (shortened to KiGa in German)
- If your child is 6-12 years old and is going to childcare after school, it is called "**Hort**".
- If your child goes to childcare with mixed aged groups, it is called a "**Haus für Kinder**" (house for children).

How do I find a place for my child in a children's daycare centre?

To find a place, ask your accommodation centre's support team or the City of Nuremberg's Youth Welfare Office. The Service Centre for Kita Places which is located there will help you find a place. Advice is given in German and English.

How does kitas in Nuremberg work?

1. Settling In

After finding a place in a daycare centre, your child has a “settling in” period at the kita. This is how it works: for a time, the mother and father attend the Kita along with the child. Together they will get to know the teachers, the spaces, the other children and the daily routine. This is so that your child can get used to the new place – as can you as a parent. That's why it's called "settling in". This is very important in Germany and is something that all parents and children do. The settling in period can last two or more weeks.

2. Doorway Discussions

Once the settling-in is complete, you bring your child to the kita in the mornings and pick them up in the afternoons or in the evenings, depending on how long you have booked. For this, there are fixed times. Everyone must stick to these times. This is very important for the children, as it means that the childcare workers can “work” with the children without being disturbed. When you bring your child and when you pick them up, you can speak to the childcare workers and tell them what is important for you, or how your child is doing. When picking up your child, the childcare workers will briefly tell you what your child has done at the kita and how your child handled things. And when the kita needs something from you, or is planning a trip, you will be informed about this. This is what is called a 'doorway discussion' (Tür- und Angelgespräch).

3. Parents' Meetings

Normally, two parents' meetings are held over the course of a kindergarten year. This applies to all parents and all children. In these meetings, you will be told what your child has learned at the daycare centre, what is going particularly well and where there is room for more development. An interpreter can also come to these appointments so that everyone can understand each other well. Sometimes, there is also something important to discuss outside of these regular dates. You as a parent can also ask for a meeting if you are concerned about anything at the kita or if you want to let the carers know about something important related to your child. If this is the case, the day care-centre will arrange an appointment with you. An interpreter can also come to this appointment so that everyone can understand each other well.

4. Parents' Post

In almost every kita, there is a postbox for each child. The kita leaves information for the parents in this postbox. These "letters to parents" contain a lot of information, for example about plans for parties or school trips. The information can also be about new kita regulations that are important for parents, e.g. that drop-off times are changing, or that there are new rules about where to leave pushchairs. It's important that you read the parents' post. If you can't read the parents' post, ask the kita to help you. The letter could be translated by an interpreter, or by other parents.

5. Parents' Evenings

It is good if you take advantage of these meetings. The dates of the parents' evenings are posted on signs in the kita, written in the letters to parents, or you will be told about them in person.

6. Day-to-Day in the Kita

There is a specific daily routine at each kita. Usually, it goes something like this:

- The children are brought into the daycare centre by their parents in the morning at a certain time. Every nursery has drop-off and pick-up times that are usually complied with.
- In the course of the morning the children have the option
 - to have breakfast. Either the kita makes the breakfast, or the children bring something with them from home.
 - In their "free play time", the children can play together with each other, make and build things, or do gymnastics.
 - In the Morning Circle or Children's Circle groups, all the children get together to discuss important topics, sing songs or learn new games.
 - There are also targeted options and projects: The children can make or build things, get exercise, listen to stories or receive targeted support.
- At least once a day, the children can go into the garden and enjoy nature.
- At noon, everyone has lunch together:
 - Depending on the age, children can have a nap or have a quiet time to play.
- Then it's time to play again.
- The children receive drinks in their daycare centre. In addition, fruit and an afternoon snack are also often provided.
- Finally, the child is collected at the time that you have agreed with the daycare centre.

7. Conflicts at the Kita

Sometimes there are misunderstandings between parents and staff. This can happen if parents and staff have different ideas about the child. Sometimes parents find things that the staff do strange, but sometimes the staff find things that parents do strange. In these cases, it's important to talk together and to ask the question: Why are you doing things in this way?

If parents or staff can't agree, you can contact the daycare centre management or the parents' council. If this doesn't solve the problem, you should contact the operator of the kita or the

Youth Welfare Office of the City of Nuremberg. There are people who work at the Youth Welfare Office especially to deal with conflicts between kits and parents.

Pregnancy and Birth

Pregnant women in Germany get extra support and are entitled to advice, medical care and support for the purchase of new products for their babies. If you are pregnant, the first step is to visit a gynaecologist (women's doctor). You should go there for regular check-ups. You will then receive a maternity record book (Mutterpass). The maternity record book is a document with important information about your pregnancy, your health and the health of your child. Always take your maternity record book with you, just in case there are any emergencies.

Delivery and Post-Natal Care


Your women's doctor (gynaecologist) will refer you to a maternity clinic. After delivery, ask for a midwife for follow-up post-maternity care at your accommodation. If the clinic does not provide a midwife, please contact »»**Early Support (Frühe Hilfen/KoKi)** (Youth Welfare Office, Coordination Office for Early Support). You will receive a birth confirmation letter from the clinic.


Initial Baby Supplies

Your maternity record book entitles you (on request) to a voucher for a baby buggy/pushchair from the Social Welfare Office. You can get it six weeks before the birth. After the birth, you will receive support for buying initial baby supplies. To get this support, you need to present the birth confirmation letter. A baby cot will be given to you in your accommodation.

Registry Office

Newborn children must be reported to the Registry Office and the management of your accommodation. The maternity hospital reports the birth to the Registry Office. If you show the Registry Office your ID, the birth confirmation letter you got from the clinic, and your marriage certificate (if you have one), they will give you a (possibly provisional) birth certificate. Please provide a copy of the birth certificate to your accommodation management so that your child can be registered.

Note: Please only provide original documents. An officially certified translation into German is required for documents that are in any language other than German.

Children's Doctor (Paediatrician)

There are ten early-detection check-ups (U1-U9 and J1). Up until the age of 6, children are regularly examined and supported in their development. The U1 (examination after birth) and U2 examinations usually take place in the clinic. For further examinations, you must make an

appointment with your children's doctor (paediatrician).

💡 When you apply for a place at a children's daycare centre, they may ask for proof that your child has attended all the early detection check-ups.

Family Planning, Contraception and Sexual Counselling

You decide for yourself if and how many children you want to have. Nobody can force you to have children. Another way of saying this: You have the right to family planning.

The German Language

Learning German is important for finding work in Germany and for finding your way around. Here you can find options and advice centres for learning German. There are many different ways to learn German. There are different options depending on your residency status. If you don't speak German so well, then you will need support. You can find contact details for the support you need here too.

When you need advice on issues related to education, you can find it in the [»»Database of Education Services for Newly Arrived Migrants](#), which provides educational options for new Nurembergers and a lot of additional supporting information. The database can help your advisor to find the right option for you.

Integration courses

In the **integration course**, you will learn German up to speaking level B1 across 600 teaching units. Over the course of 100 teaching units, you will gain insights into the culture, politics and social customs of Germany. There are also special forms of the integration course, which in some instances include more or less teaching units. The integration course with literacy training includes, for example, 900 teaching units. The integration courses are free of charge for refugees as well as for other target groups who receive social benefits.

You may attend an integration course,

- if you come from an EU country or are a late resettler.
- If you have a temporary residence permit and come from Syria or Eritrea.
- regardless of the country of origin, if you have legal tolerance according to § 60a paragraph 2 sentence 3 of the German Residence Act (AufenthG).
- regardless of the country of origin, if you have a residence permit, meaning if your application for asylum has been accepted (the positive decision is not sufficient).

They may be required to participate in an integration course by the job centre, Social Services or the Immigration Office. If you are not obliged but want to participate in an integration course, you can apply for the integration course at the [»» BAMF](#). If you need assistance with the application, please contact your [»»Asylum Counselling Services](#) or [»»Immigration counselling](#). There you can also be supported in the selection of an integration course sponsor. You can decide in which language school in Nuremberg you want to take the integration course.

Vocational language course (DeuFöV)

Vocational German language courses help to improve your own German language skills, for example, after having already taken an integration course. The so-called DeuFöV courses can be attended alongside a job, education or a vocational qualification measure or as preparation for starting a career in Germany.

The basic modules of the **DeuFöV Courses** are aimed at guiding you to speaking level C2 in three modules of 300 teaching units. Each of these modules includes a certification exam.

Prerequisite for participation is a speaking level of at least B1.

However, there are also special modules that only require speaking level A2 or B1. Additional special modules are specifically adapted to specific professional groups.

The offer is open, among others, for

- Persons with an immigration background in measures under SGB III, including: German nationals with an immigration background, EU citizens, other immigrants, including persons in the asylum procedure with [good prospects of permanent residence](#) and tolerated foreigners according to §60a Section 2 Sentence 3 of the German Law on Residence (AufenthG). If you belong to these groups of persons, you must have received the right to participate from the **employment agency**. Refugees from so-called safe countries of origin in the asylum procedure are excluded.
- Persons with an immigration background in respect to the SGB (social code) II, including: German nationals with an immigration background, EU citizens as well as other immigrants and recognised asylum seekers. If you belong to this group of persons, you must hold an eligibility to participate from the job centre.
- Persons obtaining initial qualification, in vocational training or in a recognition procedure or persons who need a certain speaking level for admission to their profession in Germany. If you belong to these groups of persons, you must have received the right to participate from the BAMF (Federal Office for Migration and Refugees).

If you are not employed with social security contributions, participation is free of charge. Employees receiving social security contributions must pay a contribution of €2.07 per teaching unit.

Volunteer-Run Language Programmes

In addition to the official German courses, Nuremberg has many other options for practising German.

These groups are run by volunteers. These are mostly people whose first language is German. Sometimes they are retired teachers. Anyone can come to these groups, regardless of their residency status.

German courses for initial language orientation

The **German courses for initial language orientation** (also initial orientation courses) provide both elementary knowledge of German as well as information about life in Germany. The content constitutes a practical first experience for participants in a new social environment and helps with their orientation in everyday life. One course comprises 300 teaching units, each

45 minutes long. The modules of the course cover topics such as "health/medical care", "work", "kindergarten/school", "housing", "local information/transport/mobility". The focus is on oral communication: Participants should learn as quickly as possible how to find their way around in everyday life. In the case of initial orientation courses, it is also a question of teaching values.

Initial orientation courses are primarily intended for asylum seekers with an unclear prospect of permanent residence. Provided that there are free places on the course, recognised asylum seekers, tolerated foreigners and asylum seekers with good prospects of permanent residence may also participate. However, the initial orientation courses are not intended for persons who are subject to compulsory education (6 to 15 years old) or vocational training (16 to 21 years old). If you are given access to an [»»integration course](#) while participating in an initial orientation course, it is possible to switch. The people on the courses have a very different educational background. Illiterate people can attend the courses as well as graduates. Initial orientation courses are free of charge.

The course language is German - interpreters are not present on the course.

Contact an [»»Immigration Advice Centre](#) or your [»»Asylum Counselling Services](#). They will help you to find a suitable course.

Learning German Independently

You can, of course, also learn German independently – without attending a course or in addition to a course. Your [»»Helper Circle](#) can support your learning. One great place to learn German independently is in a library:

Nuremberg City Library has many language courses with audio CDs, language-learning software, dictionaries and other materials for learning German.

You have to pay an annual fee to borrow things from the library. Adults aged 18 and over pay €20 for one year. Students, school pupils and Nuremberg Pass holders pay €10 for one year. For children and teenagers under the age of 18, borrowing things is free of charge.

Learning in the library and using the WiFi and the internet-connected PCs are free of charge.

You can take items home with you – books can be kept for 28 days and DVDs for 14 days. After four weeks, you will have to return everything.

Important: if you don't take the items back in time, you will have to pay high fines!

In addition to the Central City Library, there are six district libraries in Nuremberg. The six district libraries have also had free Wi-Fi since 2017. There are also lots of ways of learning German for free on the internet.

The German Volkshochschulverband (DVV) runs the free website IVDL – which stands for [»»I Want to Learn German](#). This online service offers German courses from A1 level up to B1 and uses the integration course learning plan alongside digital learning materials. The website is not only useful for independent learners – the materials and supporting media are also helpful if you're on an integration course or another kind of German course.

The [»»Goethe Institute](#) has a website which is free to use and has lots of practice exercises for learning the German you'll need in the world of work. The exercises are specially adapted to certain job categories.

The radio station [»»Deutsche Welle](#) offers online language exercises that use video clips and video series. They are matched to the language levels A1 to C and are a fun addition to any other German course you might be studying.

On the [»»Tandempartners.org](#) website, you can look for and find language exchange partners. Just enter your first language, the language you want to learn and the name of the place you live in. You can also meet nice people along the way.

Access to the Job Market

Regulations on Access to the Job Market

If you are looking for work and have moved from the EU, you have full access to the job market, because of freedom of movement for workers. Refugees' rights to work vary according to their residence status. This is explained below. You will also find information on related advice centres below.

An asylum seeker with an arrival certificate or a temporary residency permit:

If you are still required live in the initial reception facility, you are not allowed to work. After that, the [»»Immigration Office](#) decides whether you are allowed to work. That is why you must always apply for an employment permit from the Immigration Office.

The following conditions are important for deciding whether you are allowed to work:

- Three months after your registration as an asylum seeker in Germany (with an arrival certificate or a temporary residency permit), you will be allowed "inferior" access to the job market. This means that the German Federal Employment Agency (Bundesagentur für Arbeit) is in the process of checking whether there is/are worker/s with higher-privileged rights for the job. In addition, the employment terms are reviewed.
- After you have been here for 15 months, there will no longer be a "priority check" when you apply for a job. However, the employment terms will still be reviewed.
- After 48 months, you have full access to the labour market. There are no more restrictions. However, you must apply for this access level from the Immigration Office, and it must be included in your temporary residency permit.

Only the Immigration Office can make a decision on your work permit for in-company vocational training. The Federal Employment Agency will not carry out a priority check or review the employment terms and conditions.

People with Temporary Postponement of Deportation (Geduldete):

- For people with a certificate granting temporary postponement of deportation (Duldung), the Immigration Office alone decides on whether they get a work permit. The Immigration Office can use immigration law to completely ban you from working.
- If you haven't been banned from working, then as a person with temporary postponement of deportation (Geduldete) you have low-priority access to the job market from the first day of your certificate granting temporary postponement of deportation (Duldung).
- Otherwise, the same job market conditions as above apply.

Refugees with residence permits:

- If you have been recognised by the Federal Office for Migration and Refugees (BAMF) as a person entitled to asylum, a refugee or a person entitled to subsidiary protection, the Immigration Office will give you a residence permit. This entitles you to do any kind of job and therefore also gives you full access to the job market.



- There are different rules for self-employment!
- A definite job offer is ALWAYS required for any one of the applications mentioned above




Advice Centres

The following people are there specifically for providing refugees with advice and referrals within the job market. Here there are also differences depending on whether your asylum procedure is still ongoing, you have been recognised as a refugee, or you have a certificate granting temporary postponement of deportation (Duldung).

The Specialist Team for Migration (Nuremberg Employment Agency)

This is the point of contact for people whose asylum procedures have not yet been completed and for people with temporary postponement of deportation (Geduldete) who have been granted access to the job market. There you will receive advice on your options for working in Germany.

Recognition of foreign educational qualifications

In Germany, certificates and diplomas are very important for school, university or work. They show what you have already learnt and achieved. If you have certificates, you can have them recognised in Germany.

The Recognition Counselling Service can help you with this. The counselling is free of charge. They will tell you where to go, what documents you need and what it costs.

The advice centre will support you with the recognition procedure. It will inform you who you need to contact and tell you where you can get financial help. The aim is for you to find a profession that matches your qualifications.

School (6 to 15 years old)

In Germany, there is something called "Schulpflicht" - this means "school obligation". This means that in Germany, all children aged between 6 and 15 are legally required to go to school. The parents or guardians have a duty to ensure that their children attend school regularly. Going to state and municipal schools is free of cost.

💡 The school often gives children written information to take home with them and give to the parents. It is important that you read this information. If find it hard to understand these letters, ask your **»»Asylum Advice Centre** or your **»»Helper Circle for someone who can help you.**


School Registration


The supervisors of your accommodation will register your child with the State Education Office. You will get a letter inviting you to an appointment at the Education Authority. After that, your child can go to school.

Important: Be sure to bring your child with you! Please also bring an interpreter and the following documents:

- Your ID, your birth certificate or your arrival certificate (Ankunftsnachweis)
- Registration certificate from the Immigration Office (Ausländerbehörde)
- All documents concerning your child (ID, birth certificate, certificates, medical certificates, etc.)

The Bavarian School System

If required, your child will usually be placed in a transitional class to learn German. If your child can speak German well enough, they will be placed in a normal school class. Sometimes, however, there are not enough places in the transitional classes, so it might be the case that your child is placed straight into a regular class.

Class trips, excursions, school trips, school performances and swimming lessons are part of the lessons and the school day in Germany. Your child should participate in these classes, not just because they can learn a lot of new things, but also because these joint activities improve children's enjoyment of school and strengthen their linguistic abilities.

Special Programmes for Refugee Children and Teenagers

There are also special programmes which enable refugee children and teenagers to get started at a secondary school or a "Gymnasium" (an academic high school which focuses on preparing pupils for university):

Entry into high school: The SPRINT programme (intensive language training) is aimed at children and young people who are in transitional classes and have less knowledge of German. After

attending a transitional class, the Education Authority can choose school children that it thinks are ready for high school (secondary school). Integration into year group 6 or 7 opens the way for pupils to gain their secondary school diplomas.

A Different Path to the Gymnasium (Academic High School): For particularly talented and motivated school pupils aged up to 15, InGym offers a six-month German course which is intended to pave the way to the Gymnasium. Registration takes place via a Gymnasium that is located nearby. The child will initially attend as a guest student and then move on to the Martin-Behaim-Gymnasium.

School Supplies

You will receive confirmation from the school that your child is registered for the school. Upon receiving confirmation, you can apply to the Social Welfare Office for funding for school supplies. This amounts in total to €100, which is paid out either in one or two instalments. This depends on when your child starts school.

You can send an application to the Education Authority for your child's bus and train costs to be subsidised. This means that you don't have to pay your child's travel costs yourself. This is only possible if your child's school route is longer than 2km (1st to 4th classes). From the 5th class onwards, the route to school must be longer than 3km. Please call the school before 08:00 if your child is ill or if there is another reason that your child can't go to school. Otherwise, the school is obliged to look for your child, if necessary with the police. You may have to pay a fine.

Further Support for Pupils in Nuremberg


It is possible to receive financial support for your child with the **»»Education and Participation Package**, which covers school lunches, membership fees for cultural or sports clubs or money for participating in school trips. You must submit the application to the Social Welfare Office without delay.

Important: You must always submit the application before you pay for something yourself. If you have already paid for something, you will not get the money back.

Vocational school (16 - 21 years old)

If you are between 16 and 21 years old, you have to go to vocational school (Berufsschulpflicht). This applies to refugees and newcomers from EU countries as well as Germans.

At vocational school, you will first learn German in **professional integration classes** and get further education and support in professional orientation.

If you are undertaking a **»»dual education**, you should also attend vocational school.

Please register at vocational school in person and a maximum of 2 weeks after arriving in Nuremberg. Bring all documents for your previous school career (for example, certificates) and

your ID documents (proof of arrival/permission).

Until you reach 18 years of age, you can get financial support for certain activities at school and in your spare time through the »»educational and participation package.

Education (dual training and full-time school)

In Germany, it is a great advantage to have a **professional qualification** before starting work. People with professional qualifications earn more money on average over the course of their lives, are less likely to be unemployed, and are less likely to have temporary contracts than those without professional qualifications.

Dual education

The dual training scheme is unique to Germany. Dual training takes place about one third of the time in the »»vocational school and about two thirds of the time in a training company. You can simultaneously learn the theory and practice while earning money at a company during your apprenticeship. In this video, dual training is explained in detail: »»Dual training. Depending on the type of profession you would like to learn in dual training, you should turn to the right place:

The Chamber of Commerce (HWK) is responsible for manual professions. This involves professions such as bakers, bricklayers or painters. The Chamber of Handicrafts has a special contact person for refugees who want to start training in this field. She supports the search for training courses or an initial qualification, which can precede training.

Preschool education at the vocational school

In Germany, however, there is not only dual training, but also full-time school education at a vocational school. Vocational training provides a completed vocational training in theory and practice outside of the dual training system (without an apprenticeship at a company). It usually takes two to three and a half years. The course takes place full-time and includes general subjects in addition to the professional subjects. Since the vocational schools differ greatly in terms of their faculties, admission requirements, training duration and further education possibilities, it is advisable to make enquiries at the school in question. Education and participation package (BuT)

If you receive social benefits, you can apply for support for your child from the "education and participation package".

This applies:

For children up to their 18th birthday.

For young adults up to their 25th birthday if they go to school and do not receive a training allowance.

The following benefits are available:


- 15 euros per month: Children and young people up to the age of 18 can receive vouchers for courses, leisure activities or sports.
- Excursions and school trips: Costs for excursions and trips lasting several days (e.g. travel, meals, admission) are covered.
- Lunch: Vouchers are available for shared lunches at school or daycare centres. Snacks from the school kiosk are not paid for.
- School supplies: An amount is paid in two instalments per school year for materials such as exercise books, books or photocopying costs.
- Learning support: If the school confirms it, vouchers for learning support can be provided.
- School transport: In special cases, the costs of travelling to school are covered. Please contact the social welfare office.

The advice is given free of charge. There is help, support, information and education available on the following topics:

- Recognition of school/university degrees from outside Germany (guidance/initial counselling)
- Educational and social insurance systems (information and education)
- Authorities, e.g. explanation of decisions/procedures;
- Financial support for various things, including help filling out application forms, foundations for non-German national and refugee-specific issues such as residence rights, the Federal Employment Law, and work permits
- Living and Working in Germany

Important offices

Citizens' offices

If you are a new resident of Nuremberg, you must register. You can do this at one of the citizens' offices in the city of Nuremberg.


You need an appointment to register in Nuremberg. Please [book](#) this online ([online appointment booking](#)). Under "Meldeangelegenheiten", select "Wohnung anmelden (Zuzug nach Nürnberg)". You will be given the addresses of the citizens' registration offices when you book your appointment online.

All persons aged 16 and over must appear in person for registration. However: If a married couple or a family has come to Nuremberg together, only one of the spouses needs to come to the Citizens' Registration Office. Children under the age of 16 do not need to be present.

The passports of all persons must be available. If there are no passports, an identity card is also sufficient. If you are moving to Germany and are married, please bring your marriage certificate with you. If you have children, please bring their birth certificates. These should be in international form.

You will need these documents for your appointment:

- All existing identification documents of all parties involved
- Confirmation of residence from your landlord/landlady (you can download this [here](#))


 Please bring someone with you to translate if you do not speak or understand German well enough. This is important so that you can understand all the information correctly and make yourself understood.

When you arrive, you will be given your first appointment at the social welfare office (SHA). There you will be asked about your financial circumstances (for example, whether you have any valuables such as jewellery or money). You will sign some documents and declarations. Please bring all your papers and all the people listed on your "**Aufenthaltsgestattung**" (**residence permit**) with you to this appointment. Do you have an interpreter? Bring it with you.


You will receive money for your living expenses. The money will be transferred to your [payment card](#). Please note that the amount must be sufficient for one month. You will normally only receive money from the social welfare office once a month.

The Job Centre

Job Centre is where you go if you are unemployed or need support. It gives you financial support and can also help you to find a job or get qualifications, depending on what you need. Amongst other things, it can help you to find a language course, give you career advice, and help you to get your qualifications recognised in Germany.  If you have a temporary residency permit – meaning that your asylum procedure is still ongoing or your application for asylum has been rejected and you have a certificate granting temporary postponement of deportation (Duldung) – then the [»»Employment Agency \(Agentur für Arbeit\)](#) is where you go for career support.

Steps to Take After a Positive Decision


You have received a positive decision from the BAMF, so the asylum procedure has come to a positive end – in other words, you have been recognised as a refugee. These are the steps you take next:

1. Personal interview

- You will have to go to the Job Centre during its opening hours.
- You will be registered as a client.
- Your job history will be written down.
- An advice session will be scheduled. One with the service department and then with the Job Placement Service – so you will have two advisers.
- You will be registered as a jobseeker.

2. Administration Department

- **Important:** Advice will only be given if you have an appointment.
- Applications for financial support are made during an appointment with your financial support case worker.

3. Job Placement Service

- **Important:** Advice will only be given if you have an appointment.
- If you have certificates or letters saying that you are required to attend an integration course or confirming that you have taken part in an integration course, bring them with you.
- If you have documents about school attendance, training, work testimonials/reference letters, recognition of qualifications obtained abroad, etc., please bring them with you.
- Tell your case worker about any special skills you have (trades, crafts, language skills, etc.).
- Before you go, think about what kind of work you want to do.

Note: The staff at the Job Centre are not allowed to pass information about their clients at the Job Centre to anyone else. As a volunteer, a **>>>Letter of Authorisation (Vollmacht)** is required. It must be filled in and signed by both parties.

Federal Employment Agency (Agentur für Arbeit)

If your asylum procedure is still ongoing or if you are a tolerated foreigner, the Federal Employment Agency is your point of contact for questions concerning the transition from school to work (career guidance), job placement and counselling on continuing vocational training and for employer advice (employer service).

B.U.D. - Counselling. Support. Documentation for victims of right-wing extremist violence

B.U.D. is a Bavaria-wide counselling centre for victims of right-wing, racist and anti-Semitic violence. B.U.D. counsels and supports people who have been insulted, threatened or attacked by right-wing extremists or racists, or who have witnessed an attack.

There you can talk about your fears and your emotional situation. B.U.D. will explain the course of an investigation and accompany you to the police and to court if you wish to be accompanied. You will also be helped to find lawyers and therapists.

Counselling is free, confidential and outreach. If there are communication problems, an interpreter will be organised. B.U.D. is independent of state authorities. You decide for yourself how B.U.D. can support you.

Become active as a volunteer

Volunteering in Nuremberg

Many people in Germany do voluntary work. This means that they work voluntarily in their free time because they enjoy it. These people don't get paid for it. They also say: get involved. This means working for other people or for a cause. Anyone can work as much as they want. You have to speak German well for almost all voluntary work. For some activities, speaking German is not so important. In Nuremberg, over 100,000 people do voluntary work without being paid.

There are many opportunities to do voluntary work. For example, you can

- help older people
- help look after children

- work as a sports coach in a sports club
- support people with disabilities
- work as a paramedic
- Helping refugees
- help at an animal shelter
- and many other things

Volunteering during the asylum procedure in Nuremberg

Even if you are still in the asylum procedure, you can do voluntary work. As a rule, you do not need permission from the Foreigners' Registration Office to do voluntary work.



However, there are exceptions! You can only take up the so-called "Federal Voluntary Service" if you are recognised as entitled to asylum and have a work permit from the responsible immigration authority.

For some voluntary activities (but not all!) you will receive money. This amount is called an "honorary allowance". If you receive benefits in accordance with the AsylbLG, you may receive up to 200 euros per month free of charge. This means that this amount of money will not be deducted from your benefits. Even if you are already recognised, i.e. receive benefits from the job centre, you may keep up to 200 euros per month without your benefits being reduced. It is best to enquire where you would like to do voluntary work as to whether there is an allowance for voluntary work.

If you would like to volunteer in Nuremberg and already speak German well, you can get advice. **Free coun** selling takes place twice a week. Anyone can come!

Everyday life

Are you new in Germany?! Moving to a foreign country brings with it a lot of questions and a lot of work. Everyday life or some German ways of life must be foreign to many refugees and migrants. In order for it to be a little easier to get around in your everyday life, here are a few practical tips.

Work opportunities (AGH) for people entitled to benefits under the Asylum Seekers Benefits Act

What are work opportunities?

Work opportunities in accordance with Section 5 of the Asylum Seekers' Benefits Act (AsylbLG) are intended to promote integration into society. At the same time, they make it possible to earn money independently. Occupational health and safety regulations apply and there is accident insurance cover.

The work opportunity is not an employment relationship subject to social security contributions.

A work permit is not required.

Who can take up a work opportunity?

Recipients of benefits under the Asylum Seekers Benefits Act (not under SGB II, Job Centre) who are able to work and are not of compulsory school age.

What activities are possible?

The activities can be carried out with state, municipal or non-profit organisations.

Examples:

- Clearing weeds and leaves or cleaning paths,
- cleaning rooms and buildings,

- helping elderly people or helping others with translations.

💡 If you need special clothing, such as helmets or sturdy shoes, these are provided by the provider.

How many hours can the work opportunities last?

You can work a maximum of 20 hours per week.

How much is the payment?

You get 80 cents for every hour. The social welfare office pays the extra money by posting it to the payment card.

Do I have to do a work opportunity?

Anyone who wants to volunteer can register.

Anyone who has registered is then obliged to do the work for a certain period of time. Then the work must be done until the agreed end. Only if you fall ill or have another important reason can you stop doing the work before then.

If you simply stop without a good reason, you will receive less money from the social welfare office (benefits under the Asylum Seekers' Benefits Act (AsylbLG) may be reduced).

Are you interested in AGH?

Then talk to your asylum social counselling service in your accommodation.

Payment card

What is a payment card?

- The payment card is like a bank card.
- Benefits under the Asylum Seekers' Benefits Act (AsylbLG) are transferred to the payment card as a credit balance.
- You can use the payment card to pay in shops and withdraw cash.
- You can only spend as much money as is on the card.

Who gets a payment card?

- All persons aged 14 and over who receive benefits under the Asylum Seekers' Benefits Act (AsylbLG) receive a payment card.

- In benefit communities (e.g. families), each family member aged 14 and over receives their own payment card.

Where can I get my payment card?

- If you receive benefits, the social welfare office will send you a letter with all the information and an appointment to collect it.
- You don't have to do anything else to get the payment card.
- If you are applying for benefits for the first time and they are approved, you will receive a payment card right from the start.

Which benefits go onto the payment card?

- Benefits under the Asylum Seekers' Benefits Act (AsylbLG) are paid onto the payment card

💡 Do you receive other benefits (e.g. child benefit) or wages from an employer? Then you also need a [current account](#).

How much money do I have on the card?

- Benefits under the Asylum Seekers' Benefits Act (AsylbLG) are paid onto the payment card.
- You can view your balance online at meine.bezahlkarte.eu and in the payment card app.
- You will need your card ID and PIN to do this.

💡 You will find the card ID and PIN in the letter you receive with your payment card.

Where can I use the payment card?

- You can pay with the payment card in all shops that accept Mastercard.

💡 Look out for the orange / red Mastercard® symbol.


Are there any problems with certain transactions?


- Yes, certain transactions are not possible.
- For example, you cannot use the payment card with money transfer services such as Western Union, MoneyGram or PayPal.
- In special cases, contributions (e.g. for mobile phone contracts, VAG or Deutsche Bahn) can be transferred or collected if you provide the necessary proof in good time.

Can I withdraw cash from the payment card?


- Yes, you can withdraw cash.
- Each person in your benefit community can withdraw up to €50.00 per month.
- You can withdraw cash free of charge from ATMs or at the till in many shops.
- Withdrawals are only possible twice a month.
- After that, the card is blocked for further withdrawals.

I have lost my payment card. What do I have to do?

- You can block your payment card online at my.paymentcard.eu.
- You can also block the card by telephone at  [116116](tel:116116). This is possible in German or English.
- If you find the card again, you can reactivate it online at my.paymentcard.eu.

 Please note that the card is not unblocked by the Social Welfare Office (e.g. due to an incorrect PIN entry), but by the PayCentre!


Where can I get help?

- There is a support chat online at meine.bezahlkarte.eu and in the payment card app. This is available in several languages.

Public Holidays and Opening Times

Most major food shops in Nuremberg are open from Monday to Saturday from 08:00 to 20:00. Most shops in the city centre are open from 10:00 to 20:00. In smaller shops these times are often shorter. Sometimes there is also a lunch break. On Sundays almost all shops are closed. Except at the central station, where some shops are open.

On a public holiday people don't work and all shops are closed. There are public holidays across Germany and holidays that vary from state to state. Bavaria has 13 public holidays. Most of them are ecclesiastical.

Several times a year there is a lost property bazaar. Items that have not been collected are auctioned off there. Further information can be found on the homepage of the lost property office.

Getting around

All relevant places in Nuremberg and the surrounding areas can be easily reached by public transport (bus, tram and underground). A healthy, economical and environmentally friendly alternative to getting from A to B is by bicycle.

Public transport

Public transport is available so that you can get where you want to go in Nuremberg. The options are bus, tram and underground. In order to move around Nuremberg, there are regional trains (R-Bahn) and the city railway (S-Bahn). For other routes, there are long distance trains and long distance buses.

A timetable for Nuremberg and the region can be found at any stop, on the internet at www.vgn.de or on the VGN app.

The VAG has summarised all important information in a multilingual flyer: [»»Welcome to Nuremberg with the VAG.](#)

Important: Travelling without a ticket, or dodging the fare, will be punished! A valid ticket is required for each trip. Otherwise you pay a penalty of €60.

- You can buy a ticket at the ticket machine. Ticket machines can be found at every underground and suburban railway station. You can also buy a ticket from the driver on the bus and the VAG customer centre at the main station.
- If you use public transport more frequently, you can find out about cheaper tickets. For example, you can buy a T10 ticket, a day ticket or a monthly ticket. With the [»»Nuremberg pass](#) you can also get a monthly ticket at a reduced price.

- You do not have to pay full price for children. Children up to and including 5 years old can travel for free and there are discounted tickets for children between 6 and 14 years old.
- You can also change between several means of transport (bus, underground, suburban train) with a single ticket. Exception: Short distance (underground: 2 stations, suburban train and bus: 4 stops)

Bicycle

If you know that you will be living in Nuremberg for a longer period, it is worth buying a bike. This is cheaper than the underground, bus and tram.

Important road rules for cyclists (selection)

- Always cycle on the right side of the road
- Do not cycle side by side but rather one behind the other
- If there is a cycle path, you must ride along the cycle path (only on the right side of the road in the direction of travel)
- Only children up to 11 years old are allowed to cycle on footpaths
- It is dangerous if you end up on the tram lines with your tyres
- It is forbidden to cycle while using a mobile phone.

Purchase and repairs

When buying, make sure that your bike is fitted with the following safety equipment. Otherwise, you will have to pay a fine when subject to a police check:

- Light at the front and rear
- Reflector at the front and rear
- Reflectors in the spokes (2 per wheel)
- Reflectors on the pedals
- Bell
- Two independent brakes

Personal liability insurance

Even if you unintentionally cause harm to a person in Germany, you must pay damages according to the law. This applies to personal injury, material damage and property damage in the private sector. For example, if you cause a traffic accident or if your child breaks a window with a ball.

In Germany, you can take out personal liability insurance that will pay for this damage to you and your family/children. You can decide for yourself if you want to take out insurance. However, we strongly recommend it. Your help centre can assist you in finding a good offer for personal liability insurance.

Internet/Wi-fi

As an asylum seeker in Germany you unfortunately have no legal right to internet access (Wi-Fi) in your accommodation. That is why there is normally no Wi-Fi in the accommodation.

If there is a telephone connection in the accommodation, it is possible that you can sign up for a Wi-Fi contract. Ask your help centre to advise you in choosing a good contract. Speak with the people living in the accommodation about the payment. Consider whether a contract that you can always cancel is better than a contract that applies for a long time (for example 2 years).

Important: Talk to your accommodation management first and ask **before** entering into a contract, whether or not Wi-Fi is technically possible and how you can give the technician access to the infrastructure.

Current account (Girokonto)

A current account is an account for people who want to make payments via the bank. Your money is available in your current account at any time.

With a current account you can:

- transfer money,

- receive cashless payments (disbursements from agencies/authorities (social benefits) are often made cashless, in other words, transferred to a personal current account),
- set up standing orders,
- use direct debiting,
- cash a cheque, pay cashless with an EC/Maestro card,
- withdraw money at the bank counter or an ATM
- and print your bank statements.

Important: Make sure that you always have money in your bank account.

Tip: Different banks offer current accounts with different conditions. Find out exactly how much a current account costs each month and what services the bank offers.

Opening an account


Decide which bank you want to have an account with. Make an appointment to open the account. You must bring the confirmation from Social Services and your ID or your proof of arrival to the appointment. Please bring one of your identity documents with you: Proof of arrival, residence permit, ID card. If no current address is recorded on the identity document, please provide a registration certificate or similar document.

Important: If you do not speak German or English, please take an interpreter along with you.

Important to note:

- Once your bank account has been opened, you will receive an EC debit card and a four-digit PIN code. Sign the back of the EC card and memorise your PIN code. You will need the PIN code for cashless payments and to withdraw money from ATMs. **Make sure you keep your card and your PIN code separate.**
- If you want to withdraw cash, you should use the ATMs of the bank where you have your account. Then the withdrawal is free. If you enter the PIN code at the ATM incorrectly 3 times, the EC card will be confiscated by the machine and blocked. In this case, you must ask your bank.

If you lose your EC card or it is stolen, have it blocked immediately. Tell them your sort code and your account number. Then ask your bank for a new EC card.



Food

Buying food

In Germany, there are many cheap discount shops and possibly slightly more expensive supermarkets (where mainly branded products are sold). In discount shops and supermarkets you can buy food for everyday needs. Food from specific countries or regions of the world can be found in a well-stocked supermarket or in smaller stores in the district. There are also smaller specialty shops, such as bakeries and butchers, which are spread throughout the city. In drugstores, you find hardly any food, but different toiletries and household products. For example, you can buy nappies and cleaning supplies.

Different halal products and kosher food are available in a well-stocked supermarket. However, there are also food stores that specialise in this. More information: [»»Halal and kosher](#)

Nürnberger Tafel e.V.

The Nürnberger Tafel e.V. helps people in Nuremberg, who do not have a lot of money. You can also pick up food and hygiene items at the Nürnberger Tafel e.V. free of charge if you do not earn money yourself or do not earn enough money.

Before you can go spending, you need an identification sheet. This can be issued at the central office. To obtain this, you need a "proof of need". You will receive this with your temporary resident permit/ID card and the asylum-seekers' notice from Social Services (this is the letter from Social Services, which tells you how much money you get for one month).

Mobile phones

In Germany, there are generally two different types of mobile phone (“Handy”) contracts:

Pre-paid contract and **term contract**. The prepaid contract does not have a fixed term. The fixed-term contract has a minimum contract period. This contract will be renewed automatically if it is not terminated. If you do not want this contract to be renewed automatically you have to make this known in writing. Make sure to observe the notice period.

Ask your help centre for help, so that you can choose and finalise a good contract.

10 important questions about taking out a contract:

1. What is the monthly fee? Does the fee increase after a certain period?
2. Is there a minimum monthly fee?

3. How long is the contract period (e.g. 12 or 24 months)?
4. If I don't terminate the contract, will it be renewed automatically? When do I have to terminate the contract if I do not want it to be renewed?
5. How much are the fees for setting up, changing or deactivating?
6. What is the charging period (60/1, 10/10)?
7. How much does a minute cost (different/own network)?
8. What are the costs for buying a mobile phone with and without a contract?
9. How much does Internet access cost?
10. How much does it cost to call abroad?

What is the Nuremberg pass?

The Nuremberg Pass is an offer by Social Services of the city of Nuremberg to support people in Nuremberg who do not have much money. Many offers in the fields of education, culture, leisure and sport as well as bus, underground and tram all cost less. In addition, certain pharmacies offer discounts on non-prescription medicines.

Who can apply for the Nuremberg Pass?

Anyone who receives benefits from the job centre, Social Services, the Housing Office (housing allowance) or Child Welfare Services (subsidies on fees for children's day-care facilities, etc.).

Where to apply for it?

To apply for this, you need an ID card or passport and a letter from one of the official authorities (Child Welfare Services, Social Services, Housing Office).

It is sometimes very difficult to undo this. Always check and compare several offers and decide calmly. Do not let anyone pressure you to sign. Ask your Help Centre for help and advice.

If you and your household (this means family, partner or children - not roommates/housemates) earn a lower amount of money, you can apply for a subsidised flat or house. You need a Public Housing Certificate to be eligible for this. Under certain conditions, you are also entitled to housing allowance payments. If you get money from the state for yourself and your family, you usually will not have to apply for housing allowance payments.

Moving into Your Own Home

As soon as you have a residence permit, you are usually obliged to move out of your community accommodation/decentralised accommodation. You will need to find your own place to live. If you don't have a job and thus aren't earning money, the [»»Job Centre](#) will pay your rent. But it will only do this if you need help paying your rent.

Important: once you have found an apartment, you should not sign the lease immediately. The Job Centre has to check and approve the rent contract before you sign it. The rental contract must include the following points:

- "Cold" monthly rent: The rental costs for the living space per month, excluding service and utility costs such as heating
- Additional costs: this includes operating costs like stairwell cleaning, waste collection charges, caretaker costs, cable connection etc.
- Heating costs: Costs for heating and hot water (note: you always have to pay electricity and heating costs yourself!)
- Size of apartment, number of rooms, address, landlord

💡 The "warm" rent is included everything mentioned above. It is therefore significantly higher than the monthly rent.

Deposit, initial living supplies, one-off payments for fixtures and fittings, and cancellation fee

The deposit is a security payment you make to the landlord. The amount of the deposit is a maximum of 3 months' rent. When you move out of the property, you get the money back.

Important: You must not leave any damage if you move out of the property.

You are not allowed to take the furniture from your asylum accommodation. That's why you need new furniture. You can submit a request for initial supplies to the [Job Centre](#). You will then receive a flat-rate amount from the Job Centre. This amount can vary according to the number of people and the size of the property. Find cheap and used furniture or other furnishings here: [»»Furniture, Crockery etc..](#) If the person who was previously living in the home leaves fixtures and fittings there, you can buy those things. In German, this is called "Ablöse".

Attention: It may take a few weeks for the money to be paid by the Job Centre!

Please remember to re-register, in other words you need to re-register your new address (in person) at the [»»Residents' Registration Office](#).

House rules

There are certain regulations for living together that are defined as house rules. These apply to all persons who live in shared accommodation or an apartment. The most important content is:

Noise: Everyone in the house is responsible for keeping the noise level to a minimum. Special care must be taken between 13:00 and 15:00 and between 22:00 and 06:00, which are rest periods. On Sundays and public holidays the whole day is considered as a rest period.

Waste disposal: Waste must be disposed of in the designated bin. There are different bins for plastic, paper and cardboard, fruit and vegetables (organic waste) and other waste. Please respect the correct rubbish separation, because the majority of rubbish is recycled and it is an important part of environmental protection.

Ventilation: You should regularly open the windows to let fresh air in. This prevents mould from forming.

Heating tips

Save heating

💡 Set the heating less warm and ventilate properly.

Heat less warmly:

💡 The rooms in your home do not all have to be equally warm. This will save you money.

What should you do during the day?

- In the living room, 20 degrees is good.
- In the bedroom, 16 degrees is good.
- In the bathroom 23 degrees is good.

💡 Are you in some of the rooms only rarely? Then 16 degrees is also good here.

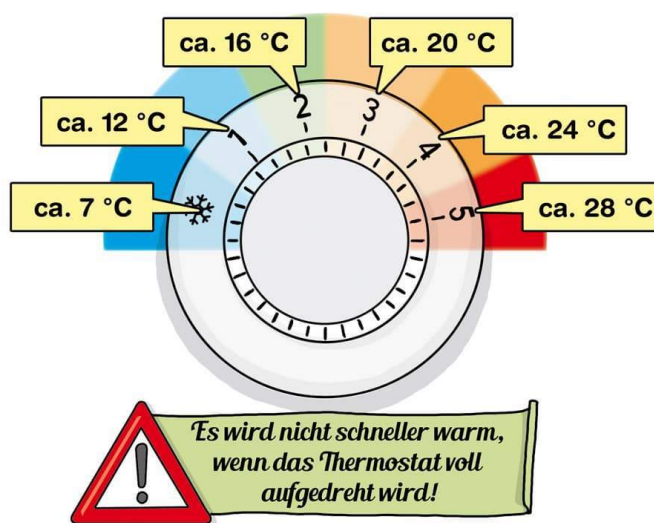
What should you do at night?

- Set the heating to a lower temperature.
- Then 16 degrees is good in all rooms.

What else can you do?

- Do not put things in front of the heating.
- Do not hang curtains in front of the heating.
- In winter it gets dark early outside. Then lower the blinds. That way the warm air stays in the room better.

Ventilate properly

💡 Do not keep tilting the window. Otherwise the walls of the room will get cold and you will have to heat more afterwards.

How do I ventilate properly?

- Open the window all the way.
- Leave the window open for 5 to 10 minutes.
- Repeat this 2 or 3 times a day. This will bring in fresh air.

💡 Always turn off the heating when airing. This will save you energy and money.

What is important in winter?

- In winter, you do not have to ventilate for as long.
- Only open the window for 2 to 3 minutes.

Power tips

Save electricity

💡 You can save electricity on many everyday tasks such as cooking or washing clothes.

Cooking:

- Use a lid when cooking.
- If you cook with a small pot or pan, use a small cooker top.
- If you cook with a large pot or pan, use a large hotplate.
- Turn off the cooker a little earlier. The heat will stay a little longer and you will continue cooking without electricity.

Do you have an old cooker?

💡 Look at the electricity consumption of your cooker. It might be a good idea to buy a new cooker. A new cooker uses much less electricity.

Do you need hot water?

💡 Then make the water hot in the kettle. The kettle uses less electricity than the cooker. Only make as much water hot in the kettle as you need.

Use the oven properly:

- Do not preheat the oven.
- Do not open the oven door too often.
- Turn off the oven 10 minutes earlier.

Electrical appliances:

💡 Turn off the TV, computer, radio or electric toothbrush completely. To do this, turn off the switch or pull the plug completely out of the socket.

Lamps and lights:

- Old light bulbs consume a lot of electricity.
- Energy-saving bulbs or LED bulbs consume much less electricity and do not break down as quickly.
- If you don't need light at the moment, turn the lamps off.

Save electricity in the refrigerator:

- Set the fridge to 7 degrees. 7 degrees is enough for food.
- Don't open the fridge so often. Otherwise the inside of the fridge will get too warm and consume more electricity.

- Do not put warm food in the refrigerator. Otherwise the inside of the fridge will get too warm and use more electricity.
- Do not put the refrigerator next to a dishwasher, next to a heater or in a sunny place. Otherwise, the refrigerator will have to cool much more and will consume more electricity.
- The refrigerator has a grille at the back for ventilation. Clean the grille regularly or the ventilation will not work as well and the refrigerator will consume more electricity.

Saving electricity with the freezer:

- Set the freezer to minus 18 degrees.
- Do not open the freezer so often. Otherwise the freezer will get too warm inside and use more electricity.
- Do not put warm food in the freezer. Otherwise the inside of the freezer will get too warm and use more electricity.
- Remove thick layers of ice. Otherwise the freezer will use more electricity.

💡 Look for the EU energy label (EU label). There are different letters on the label. These letters stand for the power consumption. A means the appliance consumes very little electricity. The letter G means the appliance consumes a lot of electricity.

Water tips

Save water

Here's what you can do:

- Shower more.
- Bathe less.
- Use a special shower head to save water.
- Use a special flush button on the toilet.
- Fix a broken tap.
- Wash the dishes properly.
- Water the garden with rainwater.

With or without a job - support from the Job Centre for heating costs

Did you know? Despite having a job, many people can get money from the Job Centre for their heating costs. Caritas Germany shows how.

It is not true that only people who already receive unemployment benefit II are supported by the Job Centre. There are many people with a job who are also entitled to a heating allowance from the Job Centre. This is because the entitlement to financial support from the Job Centre always refers to the month in which a bill is due. If you or a friend will soon receive a high utility bill, you may be entitled to support in that month.

It sounds complicated and it is a bit. Therefore, we will show how the whole thing works with an example.

Alex lives alone and earns 2,950 euros gross/month. After deducting taxes, social security contributions, health insurance and church tax, he still has 1,970 euros left over. Of this, 900 euros still have to be paid in rent (warm). In March 2023, there will be an additional heating cost payment of 800 euros.

So much for the exemplary facts, now the calculation. First, the need under social law must be calculated. This is made up of the current standard need for Hartz4, the rent and the heating cost arrears. So: 449 euros plus 900 euros plus 800 euros. The socio-legal need is therefore 2,149 euros.

Since Alex earns money, the net salary must be deducted from this. This is used to see whether the socio-legal need above 2,149 euros can be covered by the monthly salary itself. However, the net salary above 1,970 euros is not taken for this, but only 1,670 euros. This is because in the so-called income adjustment, a basic allowance of 100 euros and an earned income allowance of 200 euros are deducted.

Now for the exciting part of the calculation. So we have to deduct the adjusted net income of 1,670 euros from the social need of 2,149 euros. So: 2,149 euros minus 1,670 euros. The result: 479 euros. In this case, Alex would be entitled to 479 euros from the Job Centre in March.

For this to happen, however, it is absolutely necessary for Alex to apply for support from the Job Centre in the month in which she received the utility bill, i.e. in March in our example. In April, the bill would look different again. Because then the 800 euros for the heating cost arrears would be omitted from the socio-legal need and would amount to 1,349 euros. Alex can cover these needs himself with his monthly salary of 1,670 euros after deducting the allowances.

City Library

The City Library and District Libraries are places where you can borrow various media. There's a lot on offer: you can borrow books for children, teenagers and adults, learning aids, resources for learning German, cassettes, CDs, CD-ROMs and DVDs along with books in different languages. The Central City Library also has many cosy seating areas for learning ([»»Learning Spots](#)) and for reading.

To borrow something, you need a library card. You have to bring your temporary residence permit or your certificate granting temporary postponement of deportation (Duldung). You also have to pay an annual fee to borrow things. Adults aged 18 and over pay €20 for one year. Students, school pupils and **Nuremberg Pass holders** pay €10 for one year. For children and teenagers under the age of 18, borrowing things is free of charge.

 You can take books home with you for 28 days and DVDs for 14 days. After four weeks, you have to return everything. **Important:** If you do not bring the items back in time, you will have to pay high fees!
